### Supplementing Your Heart Health: With Omega - 3 info taken from Web MD By Midge Drouin

If you have high cholesterol or if you're at high risk for heart disease and heart attack, some supplements can help lower your cholesterol. You've likely had "the talk" with your doctor. For many people, making lifestyle changes is enough to lower cholesterol. Other people need medications like cholesterol-lowering statin drugs. Dietary supplements can be part of the prescription, too.

Here are some of the supplements that may benefit your heart: fish oil, plant sterols, niacin, fiber (psyllium), red yeast rice, green tea extract, B-complex vitamins (B6, B 12, folic acid). coenzyme Q10, policosanol.

A few cautionary notes: always check with your doctor before using supplements because some can interact with other drugs you take, including women who are pregnant or breastfeeding should not take supplements other than prenatal vitamins. Make sure you purchase supplements that have a standardized dosage, approved by the (USP) which means they contain 95% to 100% of the active ingredient.

Some fish that contain Omega-3 are: salmon, mackerel, sardines and tuna. How much omega-3 fish oil is safe? Taking no more than 3 grams of fish oil daily is classified by the FDA as generally recognized as safe. Are there side effects with omega-3 fish oil? A fishy taste in the mouth, fishy breath, stomach upset, loose stools, and nausea.



#### Bobby's Trials – by Bobby Wilson



A boy and a dog sit in a field apparently looking on as a house is being devoured by flames; sparks flying high into the dark night sky! This is the scene on the cover of a book and the first thing a prospective reader will see when they come across "Bobby's Trials." The true story behind this haunting picture is the subject of a book written by the individual who lived the story.

Without giving away too much of the story, the book describes the life and experiences of a young boy growing up in a quite dysfunctional family situation. It provides a look at his early years and his experiences while trying to live up to being the "man of the house" for his mother and sister. It tells how and why he is eventually accused of murdering both his mother and sister and setting fire to their home to cover up his crime, even while he cannot fully remember the events of that night.

The reader is provided with a moving and disturbing look inside the "justice system" as it existed in rural Oklahoma during the early 1960's; including the author's experiences while being held in jail awaiting trial. It describes an appalling lack of concern for what is today accepted as due process for those accused of any criminal offense; including such things as access to counsel, especially in the case of a juvenile being accused of murder and arson; gross misrepresentation of fact by individuals conducting the investigation, and a deliberate poisoning of the potential jury pool by various methods. The book goes on to cover the story of the trials of the accused and how the author went on to eventually become a lawyer himself. A surprising and interesting twist toward the end of the book relates how a chance happening early in his career as a lawyer leads to his recall of what happened on that night. It's all there! #### **ARIZONA HISTORY**

Another prehistoric people who lived in Arizona were the Sinagua. They were first thought to be part of the Anasazi culture or a branch of the Mogollon. The Sinagua lived near the San Francisco mountains north of modern Flagstaff, and later in the Verde Valley. It has been determined that they resided in the San Francisco mountains during the sixth and seventh centuries A.D.

They lived in both round and rectangular pit houses with center fire pits. The roof consisted of sloping poles covered with earth and the entrance was a long ramp facing east. Later, this style was replaced by the timber pithouse. Surface storage granaries made from timber were also used since the Sinagua did some farming and apparently lived a sedentary life, enjoying peace and prosperity.

Their way of life ended abruptly with the eruption of the volcano known as Sunset Crater in late 1064-65. The Sinagua may have interpreted the disaster being caused by the wrath of supernatural powers as they fled the area. They returned later and were surprised by the new richness of the soil from the volcanic overflow. Traders carried the news of the black earth to other parts of the Indian world and soon others were moving in to reap the benefits.

The resulting blend of different cultures can be seen today in the form of Hohokam ball courts and new architectural styles. The Sinagua people began building multi-room surface pueblos inhabited during the twelfth and thirteenth centuries which are preserved at the Wupatki National Monument near Flagstaff.

The Wupatki pueblos and others in the Flagstaff area were evacuated because of the twenty-three year drought (1276-1299) which turned the region into a dust bowl. Many people moved south to the Verde Valley where they joined Sinaguans who had migrated earlier and adopted the Hohokam system of irrigation. The two main populated centers were Tuzigoot, near present day Clarksdale, and Montezuma Castle, near Camp Verde.

The latter is one of the best preserved cliff dwellings in America. Montezuma Castle was constructed between A.D. 1100 and 1400 by the Hohokam and Sinagua people. It was so skillfully engineered that most of the structure is still intact. There are nineteen rooms with approximately one hundred square feet in area.

The forty or fifty people who resided here worked their irrigated farm land and supplemented their diet with wild game, berries and nuts. They wove cloth, mined salt, fired a finely-polished red-ware pottery and in general seemed to be secure in their way of life. Yet, sometime around 1400, the Sinagua suddenly left the Verde Valley.


President—Richard Smith
