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The First Parade

The first St. Patrick's Day parade took place not in Ireland, but in the United States. Irish soldiers serving in the English military marched through New York City on March 17, 1762. Along with their music, the parade helped the soldiers to reconnect with their Irish roots, as well as fellow Irishmen serving in the English army.

Over the next thirty-five years, Irish patriotism among American immigrants flourished, prompting the rise of so-called "Irish Aid" societies. Each group would hold annual parades featuring bagpipes (which actually first became popular in the Scottish and British armies) and drums.

Cabbage Soup

Served at the February 2010 Ladies Get Acquainted Soup & Salad Luncheon.

 $1\frac{1}{2}$ # ground beef

2 14.5 oz. cans stewed tomatoes

½ med. onion chopped

2 14 oz cans beef broth

1/4 tsp garlic powder

8 beef bouillon cubes

½ tsp garlic salt

½ head chopped cabbage

1 tsp dry parsley flakes

2 stalks diced celery

1 can kidney beans

Brown ground beef, onion and celery then add all the remaining ingredients and mix well. Simmer for 1 to 2 hours on stove top. You may want to add a little black pepper and additional garlic salt to suit your taste.



Meeting was called to order by Ken Camp who asked if we had any new residents. Cheryl Nagy introduced herself and her husband Guy and they were welcomed by the members present.

Minutes of the previous meeting had been passed out for members to review and were accepted by those present. The Treasurer's Report was presented by Art Roberts and also accepted. It was brought up that we must get a receipt for all cash dispersals, such as to individuals providing entertainment.

Reports were provided by several committee chairpersons on upcoming trips, luncheons, etc. Connie Riter announced that since the year was about half over, the remaining Coyote Coupon books would now be sold for \$7.50 to those who wish to purchase them.

Midge Drouin provided an update on the upcoming Patio Sale and the related White Elephant and Book sale scheduled for March 13th. Midge also requested people provide recipes that can be included in a park Recipe Book that has been in the works for over a year. She needs more recipes. Judi Quetschenback provided an update on the status of the Desert Harbor tee shirts. There have been some problems in getting the correct shirts but she has been told that the supplier will fix the problem and the shirts will be coming in. Keep the faith!

Jan Ginsburg discussed a book on "Elder Resources Guide" that provides information of use to senior citizens. Some of these books were handed out to residents and additional ones are being obtained for those who may wish to have one; and they are free.

Ken Camp discussed some issues that keep coming up and that residents need to be aware of and do something about. The first issue is litter, such as cigarette butts and paper just tossed on the ground, particularly in the area around the mail boxes. There are containers where such trash can be placed. Please use the containers and don't just throw the items on the ground. Another major issue is picking up after your animals. There are those who continue to not pick up their animal's droppings. This is a requirement of the park and also just common sense. Also when disposing of their droppings, please **do not** dispose of such items by placing them in the trash cans either inside or outside of the club house or the cigarette butt containers provided outside. These are not the places to dispose of such waste. It is both unsanitary and fails to consider other people who live in the park. Take it with you and dispose of such materials along with your other waste.

There are also some people who need to get in to see Yvonne and sign their leases. This applies apparently to those on a permanent lease as well as those on an annual lease so please check with Yvonne.

During the January meeting a decision was made to purchase some new chairs for the clubhouse which had padding rather than simply just metal seats and backs. A motion was made to scrap obtaining the chairs and using the money to buy a big screen TV instead. After some discussion about the wisdom of this, the motion was tabled for consideration at a later time.



HEALTH CORNER

How to Recognize Signs of a Stroke

...from the Internet

A nurse friend sent this and if everyone can remember something this simple, we could save some folks. A neurologist indicated that if he can get to a stroke victim within 3 hours he can totally reverse the effects of a stroke...totally. He said that the trick was getting a stroke recognized, diagnosed, and then getting the patient medically cared for within 3 hours, which might be difficult.

Sometimes symptoms of a stroke are difficult to identify and the lack of awareness could spell disaster. The stroke victim may suffer severe brain damage when people nearby fail to recognize the symptoms of a stroke. Now doctors say a bystander can recognize a stroke by asking three simple questions which can be remembered by the letters, "S...T...R..."

"S" Ask the individual to SMILE. "T" Ask the person to TALK and SPEAK A SIMPLE SENTENCE (I.e. "It is sunny out today.") "R" Ask the person to RAISE BOTH ARMS. If he or she has trouble with ANY ONE of these tasks. call the emergency number immediately. Another sign of a stroke is if you ask the person to stick out his tongue, and the tongue is "crooked" (that is, it goes to one side or the other), this may also be an indication of a stroke. These three easily remembered questions could perhaps save a life someday...

BUS TOUR OF AUSTRALIA'S EAST COAST ... by Jim McKersie

In 1990, we decided to take a two week Christmas vacation bus tour of Australia's East Coast. After flying for thirteen hours from Los Angeles we landed in Cairns (pronounced "CANS") on the west coast of the Coral Sea. This area is very much like Hawaii, tropical, hot and humid.

Cairns is a beautiful city with a large boat harbor. We were taken to our hotel with a nice room overlooking the beach and harbor. We took a walk along the esplanade where there were several tourist shops and restaurants. We retired early to allow our bodies to catch up to the new time zone.

The next morning we walked to a cafe on the pier and had an Aussie breakfast of "steak pie". It was different, but okay.

After lunch, we met in the hotel lobby to greet our tour hostess and driver. There were twenty of us from all over the world. Our mode of travel was a new fifty passenger Mercedes Benz diesel bus. Traveling on the wrong side of the road was an adjustment for many of us.

The weird sensation of being "down-under" and knowing that north was hot and south was cooler attacked us. Of course, we were also fourteen hours off schedule!

The second day was only a try-out run to a local sugar plantation and processing plant. Been there--done that in Hawaii!

That evening the tour group met on the grounds for "steak and shrimp on the barbie" and a marvelous buffet. "Barbie" is the term used for a barbeque. The Aussie's did not know how to grill a steak--well done like shoe leather! The rest of the food was excellent.

Day three started with a buffet breakfast consisting of: poached or scrambled eggs, bacon, wonderful sausage, Franco American spaghetti, Van Camp's Pork 'N Beans, fried tomatoes, and kippers (fish). We learned early on that they do not use condiments: salt, pepper, mayo, catsup or mustard. They do have "vegemite" which we never adjusted to using. This was a typical breakfast every morning.

After breakfast, we took a Reef Cat (catamaran type boat) out to Green Island which is a coral cay with a rain forest. We toured the marine land and underwater observatory. The sea life was outstanding.


Leaving Green Island we went to Norman Reef which is a large floating platform in the middle of the sea. We went on a glass bottom boat and a submersible type boat to view the reef. Many of the people also went scuba diving and snorkeled. The reef was gorgeous and the beautiful fish were outstanding. This was even better than Hawaii. A delicious lunch of shrimp on the barbie was served. The shrimp were the size of a small pork chop!

We arrived back at the Hotel just in time to shower and get ready for dinner. The Australians are big on sweets: Pavlova, Apple Strudel, pies and cheesecakes. Needless to say, we did not go hungry.

On day four after breakfast, we traveled north along the beaches of the Coral Sea to the Daintree River. We transferred to a flat bottom boat for a cruise down the river. The area is very tropical, hot and humid. We saw hundreds of large fruit bats hanging in the mango trees (their favorite diet). The river has large fresh water crocodiles that sun themselves along the banks of the river.

We met up with our bus at the ferry landing and had a very nice lunch. The hostess always called ahead with our lunch orders so everything was ready and waiting for us. We then proceeded to an Aboriginal settlement where we were told about their culture, living off the land, and taking a guided walk in the rain forest. Before leaving







Bill and I ate at this place recently. It is a family run restaurant with a pleasant wait staff. Bill said it was the best lasagna he'd ever had. I ordered a personal size pizza that was very good. The place is very clean. If you go it's located just south of the Gilbert Hospital on the same side of the street.

Dema's offers a wide range of items from appetizers and salads up to various pasta dishes and full entrée meals. They also provide Calzones and a variety of pizzas as well as a selection of desserts and beverages. Beer, wine and cocktails are also available for those wishing to partake. Prices for entrees range from around \$6 or \$7 up to as much as \$20-\$22 for some of their specialty pizzas. The views were terrific as we traveled though more than twenty tunnels and passed the Barron Falls. The bus met us at the Kuranda Station and after a brief stop for tea (lunch), we went through the rain forest to Lake Barrine, which is a large inactive crater.

We took a boat ride around the lake and saw a lot of water fowl, fish and very large eels about three feet long. One of the men would hold up a piece of meat and a large hawk would swoop down and take it from his hand. After a delicious lunch (although the room was home to several kitties), we got back on the bus for a drive to our next lodging place. It was Mission Beach where we would stay for two nights. We couldn't go into the water as it was posted "stinging jelly fish". We did enjoy walking on the beach.

Towards dusk the sky was full of kookaburras heading to the restaurant as the cook would feed them raw meat. They eat snakes in the wild, but steak will do. The Aussie's call the kookaburras "laughing jackasses" because of their shrill call which sounds like the braying of a jackass.

This is turning out to be a little different Computer article than the ones in the past. After travelling over to California to visit relatives there and those that flew into San Diego, I am back to offer all my loyal readers some opportunities that they might not have had before.

For the past few months, some of our neighbors have asked me when I was going to do another computer class. As some of you know, I conducted a Microsoft Excel class detailing some of the advanced features of this spreadsheet program. It was a "Tips and Tricks" series of classes and got a very good response from those who attended. Before I go farther, let me tell all that my experience, knowledge and forte' is in **Software**, the programs that tell computers what to do and how to do it. I am not a **Hardware** guy. I can open a computer using a screwdriver but then I stop. I have never worked on the equipment.

However, since the early 80's I have been working with computers and the software that has been installed on them. As most of you know, for the last 10 or 11 years, I have designed, developed and maintain web sites all over the country. I am working with eight of them at the present time. In addition to working with the software required to do these tasks, I have also worked with the Microsoft Office programs as well. Listed below, I have detailed the actual programs that I can use as a basis for any class my neighbors might want to participate in.

Microsoft Word (the most popular word processing program

Microsoft Excel (the spreadsheet program)

Microsoft Access (a great database program for collectors of anything)

Microsoft PowerPoint (a super presentation program)

Microsoft Outlook (the email program) NO CLASS AVAILABLE AT THIS TIME



In addition to these programs, I am also listing the Adobe programs that I use to design, develop and maintain my web sites.

Adobe Acrobat Writer (Used to produce PDF files)

Adobe Dreamweaver CS4 (the actual website producer)

Adobe Fireworks CS4 (the animated production software)

Adobe Photoshop CS4 (the photo and image editor) NO CLASS IN THIS ONE



For those interested in taking a computer class, this is what is offered: What I am offering to those who might be interested in a computer class is as follows:

- 1. Talk among your neighbors to see if there is an interest in any of these subjects.
- 2. I can do a class at the clubhouse on any night that is not already scheduled. Monday and Wednesdays are best. Tuesday and Fridays are always busy. Some Thursdays as well.
- 3. To those that are trying to find people with similar interests, I ask for a minimum of five people and no more than ten so that I can give everyone personalized service.
- 4. If any student wishes to bring along his laptop, they are perfectly welcome to do so.
- 5. These are interactive classes. I am not going to stand in front of a class and lecture for two hours.

My Dad, who was a manufacturing executive for many years, gave me this advice, "Anyone who gives their service away free tells the world what he thinks its worth". There is a nominal charge for each class.

The charges depend on the complexity and the length of each class and are determined by print costs and other minor expenses.

One other thing that I have been asked to do is to conduct a class on HTML which is Hypertext Marking Language. This is the foundation language that is used for most web sites on the net at this time. However, this language has been upgraded so much in the last twenty years that it is not being written much anymore. The upgrade that is used now is Extensible Hypertext Marking Language, XHTML which is combined with Cascade Style Sheets (CSS) to provide a much better language for the modern software to use. I would like to see you all in one of these classes soon!


It's Spring Time in the Desert


