Also worth noting is that daylight savings time begins on the second Sunday in March,


That is in most of the country but not here in Arizona.

SUNBURNS AND PREVENTIONS ... by Midge Drouin

Info taken from Web MD

The best way to prevent sunburn is to avoid sun exposure. Stay out of the sun (midday) from 10 AM in the morning to 4 PM in the afternoon., which is the strongest sunlight. Other ways of protecting yourself from the sun include wearing protective clothing such as: hats with wide brims th t cover your neck, ears, eyes and scalp, sunglasses with UVP protection, and loose tightly woven clothing that covers you arms and legs. Do not use tanning booths to get a tan. Artificial tanning devices can cause skin damage and increase the risk of skin cancer. If you can't avoid being in the sun, use a sunscreen of SPF 15 or higher. Apply sunscreen at least 20 minutes before going into the sun. Sunlight can help our mental outlook and help us feel healthier. For people with arthritis, the sun's warmth can help relieve some of the physical pain.

Problems that go along with sunburn include: heatstroke, allergic reactions, and vision problems. Longterm problems include: increased chances of skin cancer, cold sores, problems relating to a health condition, such as lupus, cataracts, and changing such as premature wrinkling or brown spots.

Other places to get help from sunburn are online resources: U.S. Environmental Protection Agency Sunrise Program, the web address is: www.epa.gov/sunwise

There are various types of sunscreens available in many forms such as creams, lotions, gels, sticks, spray and lip balms. Some sunscreens have side effects. If you become allergic to or have a side effect, call your doctor immediately for advice. You may also report side effects to the FDA at 1-800-FDA-1088.

What is the most effective Sunburn treatment?

Unfortunately there is no fast-fix treatment. Once you have been burned, the damage is done! The most effective treatment that simply helps ease your discomfort would be to keep the skin cool, moist, leave blisters intact and take an over-the-counter pain reliever. Stay away from anything that contains alcohol and anesthetics such as benzocaine.


COMPUTER IN THE CLUB HOUSE

The Road - Reviewed by Monica Bauschard

THE ROAD is a 2009 post-apocalyptic drama film directed by John Hillcoat. The film was written by Joe Penhall and is based on the Pulitzer Prize winning 2006 novel of the same name by American author Cormac McCarthy. Viggo Mortensen plays the part of the father and his son is played by Kodi Smit-McPhee. The filming of this movie took place in Pennsylvania, Louisiana and Oregon.

THE PLOT . A father and son struggle to survive after an unspecified cataclysm has destroyed civilization. It has killed most plant and animal life and obscured the sun; only remnants of mankind remain alive, reduced to scavenging or cannibalism. The father and son are traveling southward in the hope that they will be warmer. Along the way they search for shelter, food, and fuel and avoid the bands of cannibals while trying to maintain their own sense of humanity. The father has a gun but only two bullets which he is wanting to keep in case they need to commit suicide. The father has flashbacks of sequences spaced throughout the film how the mans wife committed suicide after delivering the child, and losing the will to go on .After shooting a member of a cannibal gang, the man is left with only one bullet in his gun. Later the pair enter a large house, and discover it to be inhabited by cannibals who are keeping live victims in the basement and farming their limbs; believing they will be caught, the man prepares to shoot his son, to spare him the torments, but the cannibals are distracted, and they escape.

Further down the road they find a house with an underground shelter full of food which they feast on, but as the father is too nervous to stay in one place for too long, they pack as much of the supplies as they can, and head out. They encounter an old dying man and the son encourages his reluctant father to help and feed him. Arriving finally at the coast they are robbed by a thief who takes all their supplies, food and extra clothing. They do catch up with him and get their things back, but they leave the man naked and without anything. The father due to inadequate food, becomes ill and starts to cough up blood. As they near the coast, his condition deteriorates and he realizes he is going to die. Near his death he emphasizes to his son the values of self-preservation and humanity. The father dies to leave the young boy alone, but shortly after his father death, he encounters a man, woman, two children and a dog. This family has been following them for some time and after much persuasion, the boy joins the family and the film ends with them altogether. This film is a realization of what COULD happen in the future, and it is worth watching. Sado but perhaps, true.

Cadillac Ranch is located at 2000 E. Rio Salado Parkway, Tempe in the Tempe Marketplace. This is an American Bar and Grill with a Southwest flavor. They are open seven days a week from 11 am to 2 am. Happy Hour begins at 4 PM to 7 PM with half priced appetizers. They have a large selection of appetizers from Nachos to Bacon Won Tons. Sherry and Herm Weinert visited on January 7 and enjoyed the BBQ Ribs. With the Tempe location its a restaurant frequented by many young people who enjoy riding the mechanical bull and watching sporting events on the large screen televisions.

The restaurant recommends reservations for parties of 12 or more. The phone number is 480-894-1111. The average cost is under \$20 per person, however, the steaks are a little higher.
