Clubhouse Use

- The clubhouse is intended for the use and enjoyment of all residents living at Desert Harbor. Each resident has equal access and use rights to the Clubhouse during standard operating hours with certain conditions:
- 1) Residents and/or event organizers must treat the facility as if it were their home and pickup any trash and mess caused during the event. 2) The facility must be returned to the same condition as it was prior and
- 3) Any misuse or destruction to facility property in any manner during the reservation period is prohibited.
- A.L.L. employs a cleaning crew to maintain a schedule of general cleaning for the restrooms, the Hall overall 5 days a week, Monday thru Friday. The staff does not revolve its schedule around or after Park events. Individuals or event organizers are responsible for pickup after each function. Everyone shares the responsibility to keep the clubhouse neat and clean.
- Clubhouse Restrooms Use and Misuse The shower stalls are for showering off before and after using the pool. If you are in the clubhouse for an activity, etc., the toileting facilities are available for your convenience but they, again, are not for use in lieu of using your own at home.

Snowbirds and Summer Vacationers

• Residents who leave for periods longer than two (2) weeks are required by Park Policy to inform the Property Manager the date of your departure and the estimated date of return. For security reasons as well as maintenance purposes, it is imperative that management knows who will be responsible for your property and landscaping during prolonged absences.

A Desert Harbor Profile

In our community, Al Pein is as close to being a fixture as anyone can be. It was only natural he became involved with the community soon after

arriving in 1998. In less than a year he was elected vice president of the activities club. He became president one year later serving for three years. He is the expert with activity by-laws, revisions and the elections process. Al compiles the activities calendar and for three years, he and his wife prepared pancake breakfasts for the community which was a regular event on Saturday. In his spare time, he collected aluminum cans to recycle and donated everything to the Activities club.

Al was born on October 20, 1922 in New York City and he was ten before his only brother was born. The family stayed in New York and it was there at a church gathering as a teenager he met Estelle, the future Mrs. Pein. She was a very attractive young lady but admitted, they didn't like each other much at first. Of course that all changed in time and it didn't take long for both to discover they were made for each other.

Although Al was drafted into the Army/Air Force during WWII, Estelle was not to be left behind. She boarded a train for the long ride to Gulfport, Mississippi, where he had temporarily been stationed. The two were married there in a simple ceremony in July, 1943. Truly they found love and now are approaching 64 years by each other's side.

Al returned home after the war to begin his life and start a family. The newlyweds settled on Staten Island where, like all young couples at the time, began raising their soon to be three children: John, Barbara, and Eileen. As a family guy, he was a natural so when son John joined the Boy Scouts, Al too got involved and was soon presented the Silver Beaver Award for his distinguished service. In addition to Scouting, he and Estelle were involved with the Staten Island Varsity Club (SIVC) where they worked together raising money for high school scholarships. Not satisfied with just doing a job, Al becomes SIVC president and serves for a number of years.

The couple got the RV bug and after selling a summer house in Lavalette on the Jersey shore in 1972 and now with a new Winnebago RV, they took to the road every chance they could with their schnauzer dog, Heidi. We've seen how Al leans toward leadership roles, it's no surprise he initiated the first Good Sam RV Club in his home town of Staten Island. Yes, if you didn't guess, he became Director of the Good Sam Club in New York State and served there for eight years.

After years of working up the ranks, Al happily retired as an accomplished steamfitter/pipe-fitter in 1984 from Kerby Saunders, Inc. With the trials of work and raising three children behind them, the Pein's began traveling throughout the Country. Even-



tually they sold their home on Staten Island and settled in Zephyrhills, Florida. In true fashion, Al worked himself into being president of the social club at Palm View Gardens where they lived. It was here that Al now in his sixties, seriously took up golfing for the first time. Let it be known, he still gets his fair share of pars.

With age creeping up and the desire to live closer to their kids and grandkids, Al and Estelle decided to move everything from Florida to Arizona. They've always been proud parents but now they're even more proud of their eight grandchildren and three great grandchildren. Throughout life, Al has always remained busy. Although now and it's not by choice, Al has had to slow down a little where these days he only coordinates Desert Harbor's weekly golf tournament, maintains the club By-Laws, plays card games, cribbage, poker, attends numerous park activities on a regular basis, challenges the guys twice a week at pool in addition to spending a fair amount of time emailing family and friends and still finds time to tinker in his work shop. After nearly eighty-five years, he can't do as much as he use to saying, "It's time to let the young guys do something!"

Middle daughter Barbara (AKA Cookie) and her Pomeranian dog Foxy moved in with the folks a few months ago. Since then for the first time in a long time, we have some competition. Foxy thinks she's in charge and Pop says he is. I can almost hear him trying to convince her during their evening walks that he's the boss and she should just accept it. Admittedly, my dog was spoiled rotten before but now since I've moved in, Mom and Dad have made this condition so much worse ... ADMIT IT!

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The Little Texas Hold'em Tournament

For anyone interested in a little more serious form of this game, you might be interested in what we've done in the past.

First a little background on how the Little Texas Hold'em Tournament started. In April, 2003. Myself with Reni's help, taught a class for people who had never played Texas Hold'em. About 12 people attended the class and we started playing No Limit Texas Hold'em on alternate Sunday afternoons. We also cooked hamburgers, sausage links or ordered-in pizza plus a salad when the game was over.

We held our first tournament in the summer of 2003 as an activity when all of the winter visitors had left. I can't remember for sure but I think the entry fee or buy-in was \$5 for each player

with three top winners receiving 50%, 30% and 20%. I think we had 10 players. It became an annual event each summer. Last year, several people asked me to play in the winter and we did. I think we may hold 2 tournaments this year, one this summer and one when our winter visitors are back.

The Little Texas Hold'em Tournament has evolved to this format:

- 1. Buy-in is \$25 with no re-buys.
- 2. Each player gets \$1,000,000 in chips.
- 3. All money collected from buy-ins are paid to the top three players

at 50% for 1st place, 30% for 2nd place and 20% for 3rd place.

- 4. Last tournament we had 14 player at \$25 X 14 = \$350 and 1st place received \$175, 2nd place \$105 and 3rd placed got \$70.
- 5. We allow for substitutes if a player needs to be absent at any session.
- 6. We try to wrap up the tournament in about 5 sessions but the past tournament dragged on too long. We will try to change the rules to prevent that from occurring on the next tournament.

For those people, who don't know how to play Texas Hold'em, who want to learn more, we will offer another class. It takes less than a hour to learn. The last part of the session is devoted to playing a short game for fun (no money). The total duration is about 2 hours. We've put a sign-up sheet in the Clubhouse if anyone is interested in attending this class.




