Even the word "Easter" has its origins in the name of the Mother Goddess of Northern Europe called "Eastre" which means "Spring" in their ancient language. There are many symbols associated with Easter but the two most common are the Easter Egg and the Easter Bunny.

The Easter Egg as a symbol of this holiday is fairly easy to explain. The shape of the egg is oval. It is the shape of a drop of water and of a seed. Both are symbols of life and Easter celebrates life. But the egg also promises new life. Especially in the Easter season of spring, the young chick emerges from the egg as a new life. The rabbit, because of its prolific breeding characteristics, is also a symbol of the new life of Springtime....but there is an old German legend of the Easter bunny which is fun to consider.

Other symbols of Easter are the candle which quietly lights up the darkness with its gentle light, the lamb which is symbolic both to Christians and the Israelites, the white Easter lily which symbolizes purity; bells, spring flowers, and the cross. One of the more unusual symbols is the pussy willow. These were picked at Easter in England and Russia and people would (gently) tap each other on the shoulders with a branch--for good luck!

Whatever the symbol used, there is a joy at Easter and Springtime as the world looks forward to "new life." Ultimately the joy of Easter is in the heart and lives of those who feel that life is worth living, that we are worth loving, that friendship is sacred, and that all does not end forever with the passing of this life.



It appears that the election season has come to an end. During the Primary Election held 10 March 2009, all incumbent members of the City Council were returned to office. These included Mayor John Insalaco and Council Members Douglas Coleman, Richard Dietz, and Robert Eck Jr. A General Election later in the year will not be required since all of the incumbents received a sufficient number of votes in the Primary election to make the need for a General Election unnecessary. We wish to congratulate the winners as well as all of the other candidates that participated in the election.

The ballot proposition regarding what is known as Home Rule, or Proposition 100, passed handily which will be good for the city as it can now continue to fund those programs and services that residents of AJ consider to be important. It will not have to revert to a state mandated limitation that would prevent the city from spending money it already has, for services that its' citizens consider necessary.

In the Recall election, that was held in conjunction with the Primary election the incumbent members of the City Council including the Mayor prevailed and the recall was defeated handily.

the future. The idea of Arbor Day started on January 4, 1872, when J. Sterling Morton, a member of the Nebraska Board of Agriculture introduced a resolution that the tenth of April, 1872 be set apart for the planting of new trees and that it be called Arbor Day. He forcefully pictured to the people in his area what value, beauty, and comfort the planting of trees would bring. Over a million trees were planted that first Arbor Day in Nebraska. Over the years with the support of the National Education Association, Arbor Day grew in popularity and support among school children and others even in other countries. It is even celebrated as a school festival in Australia.

Today all states have an Arbor Day and most recently the last Friday in April has been set aside as National Arbor Day in the U.S. This year Arbor Day falls on April 24th, and what better way to celebrate (if you don't want to plant a tree) than by visiting Boyce Thompson Arboretum near Superior.

They will be having a guided Sunday walk on April 19th from 1:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m. called "Trees of the Arboretum." The tour will be conducted by Horticulturist Kim Stone and you can enjoy a relaxed, leisurely tour through the forested areas of the Arboretum. Learn about the towering Sycamores and Cottonwood trees, the native Palo Verde and Mesquite trees. Meet "Mr. Big," the giant Eucalyptus tree, and see what is so strange (besides the name) of the Boojum tree. This is a rewarding place to visit and dogs are permitted as well, as long as they remain on a leash. You and your favorite pet can celebrate Arbor Day together!

Starting out from the station, passengers enjoyed peaceful meadows where herds of grazing cattle were seen before heading into the canyon.

The Verde River soon came into view. The meadows turned rocky and canyon walls began to appear as our journey entered the river canyon and followed the river that flows from surrounding mountains. Along the way, we began to see nesting American Bald Eagles on the canyon walls

and in trees and many migratory birds in the calm waters on the river. We saw Great Blue Herons and Red-tailed hawks, deer, and were told that even elk had been seen in and around the river.

Our journey took place on Valentine's Day and combined the love of the outdoors with the romance of chocolate on this special day. The trip was appropriately called the decadent Chocolate Lov-

er's Train. Passengers were treated in firstclass fashion with living room-style seating. There were complimentary salads, sandwiches and other appetizers, not to mention chocolates of all descriptions. It was truly a chocolate lover's dream and it made this trip just that much more memorable.

understanding "computerese"

Mac or PC, hardware or software...your grandkids can probably tell you the difference without even thinking.

However, as you contemplate the purchase of a computer for your home, there are some things involved with this purchase that you should know about.

First of all, let's think about hardware. No, you aren't expected to go to Ace® and pick up nails and screws and hammers and pliers. When we talk about computer hardware, we are talking about the physical computer and its parts. The monitor, where you are able to see the results of a computer action, the Central Processing Unit (the CPU) where the computer does its work, the keyboard, the mouse which allows you to avoid typing in some cases and all the memory chips, the video and audio boards and all the cables that connect everything together are all designated as "HARD-WARE".

You can always purchase additional hardware items such as modems, CD-DVD drives, video and digital cameras and whatever else the "propeller heads" in the world invent.

By itself, hardware doesn't do anything. Look at your stereo. It sits there looking nice, without emitting sounds until the hardware pieces are given the sounds to play.

Your computer needs something to make it work also. That something is 'SOFTWARE' Software tells the hardware how to work, what to do and when to do it.

Software is what gives your computer its identity. It includes the basic operating system and all the utility or application programs, all expressed in a language that your hardware understands.

Think about the first time you balanced a checkbook. Either someone told you how or you followed the instructions on the back of the statement. Those instructions "programmed" you to do the job. Those instructions were the "software" and you were the "hardware" that did the job.

Here are some of the most common terms that you will hear as you explore the wonderful world of personal computers.

- What is an Operating System? An operating system is the master control program for the computer; it is the brain of the computer. It is stored information that your computer needs to operate. Without an operating system all the hardware would just sit there and collect dust. The hardware is like your skeleton, muscles and organs. Without a brain you would just sit there and collect dust, too! Examples: Windows Vista, Windows XP, Leopard
- What is the Central Processing Unit (CPU)? It is the computer chip that does all the processing for the computer. Inside this tiny chip are millions of transistors (electric switches) that are connected so they can carry out mathematical calculations. Everything that a computer does is essentially a mathematical calculation.
- What is Random Access Memory (RAM)? RAM is the computer's primary working
 memory. RAM is used for short-term storage while the computer does its work. It is read/write
 memory and it is volatile memory. It needs to be running to "remember" what it is doing. If the
 power goes out, you will lose all your work in RAM that you have not saved on a disk drive.
 Save your work frequently.
- **What are disk drives?** Disk drives allow you to store and move data from, and to, different types of media. There are several types of drives: floppy drive, hard drive, CD-ROM drive, and DVD drive, external hard drive, removable drive, and portable drives.

Because the computer world is ever changing, expect to see new drives in the future that will run our programs faster and make our tasks much simpler. **In the computer world, change is good.** However, you do not have to change computers every time a "new" improvement is made.

Congratulations to those of you who are still reading this very "dull" information. I do promise that, in the months ahead, reading about the world of computers will be more exciting and fun. We have just scratched the surface. This preliminary treatise is just so that when or if you decide to join the millions of personal computer users, some self-important "propeller head" looking to build his or her commission, doesn't try to confuse you with words that you have never heard before.

FYI - Fraudulent Offer

Look out for a fraudulent offer: SRP has been alerted to a mail fraud scheme involving letters containing a phony SRP check, often valued at more than \$3000, often with a promise of more money. The letters have been showing up across the US and Canada in one of the following three forms:

- 1. An initial payment for "winning" the "SRP Financial Corporation lotto".
- 2. An incentive to conduct market research for various products.
- 3. The initial payment of an unsolicited grant for small business or education.

SRP is not involved with any of these activities – even though their logo and watermark on the check appear authentic. If you receive such a check, attempting to cash it may put your financial information at risk and subject you to identity theft. In addition, the letter accompanying the check often advises recipients to call a "coordinator" to verify participation or receipt of the check. The "customer service" number usually is an expensive per-minute ploy; the caller is put on hold to accumulate excessive telephone charges. If you think you have received one of these letters, immediately contact law enforcement officials or the US Postal Inspector's office. Arizona residents, who believe they may have been a target or victim of fraud, should contact the state Attorney General's office at 602-542-5763.

Letting Guests in the Gate

If the gate is closed and you have guests, deliveries or workers coming, let them know that they should scroll down to your name and press the call button. You will receive a call at your home, if you have a land line. After identifying the person at the gate you then press 9 on your phone and that will open the gate for them. This does not work for cell



A Book Review ... by Art Roberts, Lot 81 FIRST TO DIE

James Patterson, famous for his gruesome murder depictions in his Alex Cross series, offers a slightly less horrific style in this first book of a new series about Lindsey Boxer, a homicide detective for the San Francisco Police Department.



Battling life-threatening situations, Lindsey fights a potentially fatal disease while she

tracks a cold blooded killer. With three of her female friends, a medical examiner, an assistant district attorney, and a reporter for the San Francisco Chronicle (the Women's Murder Club, as they call themselves), they share inside information about the murders which have been happening in San Francisco and spreading throughout the United States. It seems there is a serial killer who attacks brides and grooms shortly after their weddings. A suspect is in jail and the case appears to be solved--halfway through the book. Wrong! The killer strikes again. The fast-paced action moves quickly in some of the shortest chapters ever written as readers are shifted from one event to another. You will love this two or three page chapter format. The young inspector's life and love take bitter turns as events unfold. The surprise ending leaves one satisfied that James Patterson has written another great book and has begun another suspenseful series!

Reading is a great leisurely activity which can be enjoyed in retirement when we have time to do the things which we couldn't do during our working years. My favorite authors are Tom Clancy, Philip Margolian, John Grisham, and James Patterson. Mystery writers challenge me to determine who dies, who is guilty and how the police will prove it. This is an excellent mental activity and there are no commercials in reading books!

Another advantage of reading is that books don't cost very much -- and our library has many great books which you can borrow for free! Take some time, visit our library, and find out for yourself about the joy of reading. If you have books which you have already read, you might consider donating them to our library so that others may enjoy them. Just leave them on one of the tables and take one you have not read.
