Words from Management

Yvonne Cavazos, property manager

I would like to thank you for making the community safer by paying more attention to the policies concerning speed limits and overnight parking on the street. You have done a wonderful job in addressing these two areas. There was only one reported excessive speeding incident in the community this month and no reported overnight parking on the street. It is so much easier for emergency vehicles to provide immediate attention, especially at night, when there are no vehicles on the street to maneuver around.

There is another policy that we now need to focus attention on. When you made the choice to move to Desert Harbor you were aware that Desert Harbor is a 55+ community and we strive to maintain a Crime Free community. We do this by screening all residents for a criminal history in their background checks. This is for the safety of all residents and provides a very comfortable sense of security within the community.

Our visitation policy is set up to maintain the community as a 55+ community as well as continue to provide residents with that sense of personal safety and comfort. Therefore, visitors need to be supervised at all times by a resident as we do not perform criminal background checks on your visitors. This is a sense of security and trust that you need to provide to your neighbors and them to you.

Also the visitation policy stipulates that anyone that stays in the community more than 30 nights in a given 12 month period will either need to go on the lease or leave the community. (To go on the lease there are requirements that they must meet that pertain to age, background, etc.) When you violate the policy and have others living with you that are not on your lease and/or are younger than the community age requirements you are violating your neighbor's rights to have the assurance that this is a secure environment and/or is a 55+ community. They live here because this is an all-adult 55+ community; not a family community. We encourage your maintaining relationships with your families but within the community, those relationships must be done within the parameters of the visitation policy for the benefit of the community as a whole. For the complete visitation policy, please read your Community Policies.

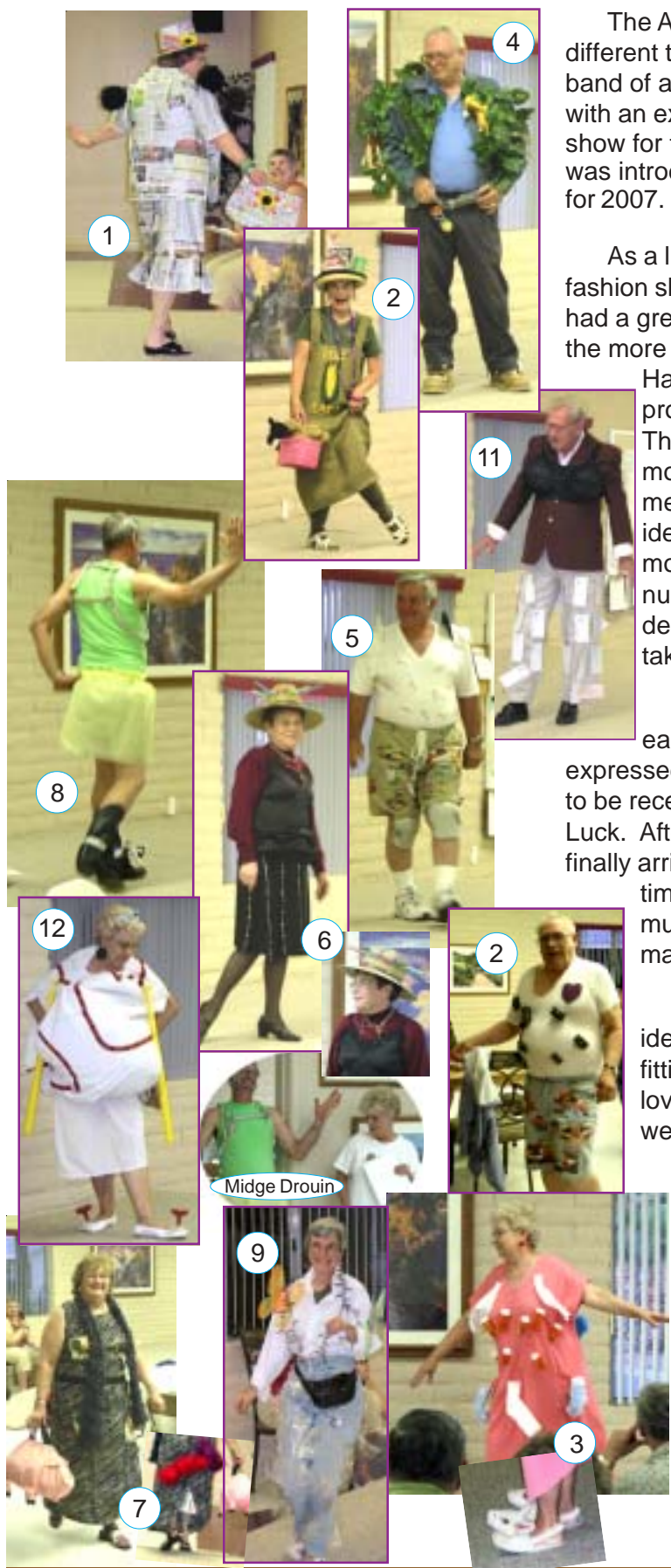

Resident's Meeting Recap

Call-to-Order: The meeting was called to order by Joe Schnier, president, at 9:03 a.m.

Treasurer's Report: There is \$1,279.02 in the Activities fund. During the month we made \$117.15 and \$105.30 from the Bake and White Elephant Sale respectfully plus miscellaneous income for a total of \$484.24. Total expenses for the month came to \$341.93.

Committee Reports included Celine Leonard for Casino Trips as she said a few more sign ups were needed for the AVI Casino/Resort trip. An announcement was made seeking interest for the Christmas Show at Barleen's Arizona Opry. Actual sign up will not take place until November. Stitch & Chat activities will end on April 11 for the summer and not resume again until the fall. Shuffle Board was moved from Thursday morning to Wednesday evening to take advantage of cool evening temps. Patio Sale was marginally successful and thoughts were this was due to the lack of newspaper advertising. A suggestion was made to hold the White Elephant Sale a week or two after individuals patio sale. The thinking was that residents could donate what they didn't sell to the Activities Organization for the community's benefit.

New Business: A Western Dinner was announced for April 28. BBQ chicken and steak will be offered along with beans, cole slaw or salad and corn-on-the-cob. A Son and Mother team will provide country & western entertainment. Board members will sell tickets for \$6 and \$8 each. Advertising in the newsletter was questioned but it was revealed that the March issue had a \$20 surplus after expenses. A resident proposed the following motion for a vote: "I move that henceforth all new Desert Harbor Organization business, activities, programs and projects be presented to the membership at their regular monthly meeting for discussion and a up or down vote by the members present. A simple majority shall rule. Findings of said vote shall prevail. In case of an emergency the Organization Board of Directors may take special action, but in any case they shall bring their action before the membership at the next monthly meeting for the memberships's approval." After much discussion, a vote was called and the motion failed to pass. Another motion for a vote was proposed as follows: "All meetings of those elected to represent the residents of Desert Harbor, known as the Board, be held in the Clubhouse of Desert Harbor." This motion passed unanimously. A resident offered to serve as go-between regarding resident/property manager issues.
