

#### Worst Case ....

By James Patterson

A serial kidnapper and killer are abducting teenagers from wealthy families setting Detection Michael Bennett from the New York Police Department's Special Investigation Division on his trail.

With ten children of his own, this case particularly hits close to home and sends Michael Bennett on the hunt.

The perpetrator is not requesting money, but has ulterior motives of his own and kills the children when they cannot produce what he requires.

Am I saying too much? Maybe.

Patterson's books always keep you on the edge and the need to finish them in one sitting is hard to resist. The books are fast moving and keep you guessing as to the outcome.

I like the way he includes the main character's families, so he becomes someone you remember from book to book.

#### Guarding the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier... By Connie Riter

We are all familiar with this monument in Washington, DC, and its significance as we approach another Memorial Day on May 31st this year. However, here are some facts about the military guards, which you may find interesting....

Each guard takes 21 steps as he walks by the length of the tomb. He hesitates for exactly 21 seconds before his about face to begin his return walk. These are symbolic of the 21 gun salute which is the highest honor given any military or foreign dignitary. The guard's gloves are moistened to prevent his losing grip on his rifle.

He always carries his rifle on the shoulder away from the tomb. The guards are changed every 30 minutes, 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

The guards are selected from the Third US Infantry (the Old Guard). To apply for guard duty, a person must be between 5'10" and 6'2" tall with a waist size not greater than 30 inches. They must commit to two years of guarding the tomb, live in a barracks under the tomb, and cannot drink any alcohol on or off duty for the rest of their lives. After 2 years, they are given a wreath lapel pin signifying their service as a guard. There are only 400 pins presently worn. Should a former guard not continue to live an exemplary life, he must relinquish his wreath pin.

The guard's shoes are made with very thick soles to protect their feet in all kinds of weather. The metal heel plates extend to the top of the shoes in order to make the loud click as they come to a halt. Every guard spends five hours a day getting his uniforms ready for Guard duty!

During the first six months of duty, a guard must maintain silence and cannot watch TV. All off-duty time is spent studying the 175 notable people buried in Arlington National Cemetery and where they are interred. These include Presidents Taft and Kennedy, Joe Lewis, and Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis and Robert Kennedy. The tomb has been guarded continuously since 1930, even during the 2003 hurricane which was predicted for the Capitol. The offices in Washington were closed for two days because of the storm, the guards were given permission to leave their post, but they refused to leave, continuing their guard on the tomb.

The monument contains remains of unknown soldiers from WWI and II, the Korean Conflict, and until 1998, the Vietnam War. That year, DNA testing identified the Vietnam soldier buried there and his remains were returned to his family in

Missouri. The inscription on the tomb reads:

"Here rests in honored glory, an American soldier known but to God."

They are the sons of Julie and Jim Rietow of Knox, Indiana.



#### BLUEBERRY SALAD...

#### **INGREDIENTS:**

2-3oz packages blackberry gelatin

1-15 oz can of blueberries 1-8oz package of Cream Cheese

1-cup Sour Cream 1-cup Chopped Pecans 2-cups Boiling Water 1-8oz can Crushed Pineapple


1/2 cup of Sugar 1/2 teaspoon Vanilla

- Dissolve gelatin in boiling water
- Drain blueberries and pineapple, reserving liquid. Add enough water to the liquid to make 1 and 1/2 cups
- 3. Stir liquid into gelatin mixture
- Stir in blueberries and pineapple and pour into a 9"X12" casserole dish and refrigerate until set.
- Cream together the cream cheese and sugar. Add sour cream and Vanilla and mix well. Spread over salad.
- 6. Sprinkle with chopped pecans and serve

#### **ARIZONA HISTORY**

On March 16th, **Gail Davison, Esther Lough, Joyce Morrison and I** traveled south of Florence to tour the St. Anthony's Greek Orthodox Monastery. It is approximately ten miles south of Florence on Highway 79.

It was a beautiful day for a leisurely walk through the buildings and grounds. It started to get warm around noon because we had on long skirts, long sleeved shirts and headscarves. They are required attire for the tour!

A group of six monks started the Monastery in 1995. They brought their one thousand year heritage from the Holy Mount in Athos, Greece. Today there are twenty independent monasteries throughout the world.

The buildings and grounds are truly a manifestation of their faith and commitment.

There is the main Church of St. Anthony's and five chapels: St. Nicholas, St. George, St. Demetrios, St. Seraphim's and St. Elijah. People are allowed to tour the Church and four of the Chapels. St. Elijah is set by itself on a small hill to the right as you enter the grounds. It is a sparkling white structure that lures you to want more, but it is closed to tourists.

The exterior of the buildings are beautiful, but the interiors are even better. Most of the wooden decorations and furniture are imported from Greece. They use no electricity except at the reading stations. The brass chandeliers are gargeous. The candles were not lit while we were there, so you have to use your imagination.

The congregation stands along the walls during services, but straight back wooden chairs are provided if you need to sit. We tried the chairs and they were even more uncomfortable than the old wooden pews from our childhood.

The gardens are well tended and we were surprised at the variety of plant life, even some that we didn't think grew in the desert. Some monks were working in the orchards.

There are tiled walkways, so walking is easy with lots of shade and fountains.

We had a very pleasant morning and traveled on into Florence and had lunch at the Mount Athos

Restaurant.

## **Health Tips**

#### Going without meat

When people consider greatly reducing or even eliminating meat or other animal based foods from their diet, they often worry about getting enough of certain nutrients, such as protein, iron, calcium and vitamin B-12.

However, if you eliminate or markedly reduce only the meat in your diet, but still consume animal products such as dairy and eggs, and a wide variety of plant-based foods, you should have no problem getting adequate protein, iron, calcium and vitamin B-12. Even a vegan diet — which eliminates all animal-based foods, including dairy and eggs.

- provides adequate protein and iron if you get enough calories and eat a variety of foods, including soy products, legumes, lentils, nuts, seeds, whole grains, and dark green leafy vegetables. The only true nutritional issues for those who adopt a balanced vegan diet are getting enough:
- Calcium If you don't consume dairy products, a calcium supplement may be necessary. Other calcium sources include fortified products such as some types of tofu, soy milk, breakfast cereal and fruit juice. Dark green vegetables, such as spinach and broccoli, also contain calcium.
- Vitamin B-12 Some foods, such as breakfast cereals, are fortified with vitamin B-12. Still, you may need to take a vitamin supplement to get this important nutrient.

## **Swimming Pool Area Reminders**

We need to be reminded about the swimming pool area rules and regulations. We do not have anyone to police or patrol the area, so it is up to each resident to observe and follow these rules and regulations

- Shower before entering pools or spa
- 2 Guests must be accompanied by a resident at all times except adult guests may get a pass from the office
- 3 Children under 18 may use the pool only during certain hours, 10am to 12pm and 2pm to 4pm, and children under the age of 2 (or in diapers may not use the pool at all)
- 4 You must be 16 or older to use the spa, it's a state law

Please do not walk into the clubhouse with wet feet. It's an extreme safety issue for others who use the clubhouse because they may slip or fall.
