July 4th, 1776 ...This is the day we all celebrate as the birth of our great nation with BBQ's, picnics, parades and of course fireworks! ...but did you know that it took another 13 years before George Washington was sworn in as our first President? In fact a lot of stuff occurred before, during and after the events of July 4, 1776 that led to the creation of what is considered the greatest country on earth.

Some events at the time included the Boston Tea Party (Dec. 16, 1773) where patriots boarded ships and dumped 300 crates of tea into the harbor as a protest for high taxes - Formation of the First Continental Congress September of 1774 - The Minutemen's "shot that was heard around the world" on April 19, 1775 and started the Revolutionary War with Britain - The surrender of the British Gen. Cornwallis at Yorktown, VA on October 19, 1781 - Drafting of the US Constitution during the summer of 1787 - and finally George Washington was sworn in as the new country' first Presidential in New York City on April 30, 1789. This was the final step that made everything official and the rest is history.

Robbery at Desert Harbor

The incident occurred on a nice balmy day about three weeks ago. Rita Champion (#37) and her daughter left to go on a short errand at about 3 o'clock Thursday afternoon. A few minutes later a couple drove up in front of their place and a female was seen exiting the car and proceeded to pick up a concrete garden angel from the Champions' front yard and place it in the trunk. This appeared odd as viewed by new owners across the street who witnessed this apparent abduction. Figuring all was less than honorable, the witnesses wrote down the vehicle's license number before the couple drove off without a word to anyone.

Later, Rita came home and immediately noticed the missing angel. She quickly phoned the police to report the theft. While officers were there taking the report, the new neighbors revealed that they had seen the incident and, in fact, noted the license plate number. The police traced the number and learned the vehicle was registered to an address in Queen Creek. Authorities promptly made a visit and cited the perpetrators and confiscated the Champions' angel.

The moral of the story is - we all need to be vigilant about matters in our community and report suspicious activity. Our safety and welfare may well depend on it. Desert Harbor has been a relatively safe community and we are fortunate to have such little crime in this area. We all must strive to keep it that way and be aware of strangers who may be up to no good.

It was a tremendous endeavor by Sales to get all of these homes set up and sold over the last year that I have been here. I really appreciate your tolerance and understanding of the construction noise, vendors and dust during that time. As there is now no need for the current vendor gate code to continue to be used I will be changing it in the near future.

Now that the community is full it is even more critical that we fine tune some of our safety issues. I need for all of you to invent your own personal gate codes. Even if you have a remote you need a backup way to get into the gate if the remote does not work. I will be changing the vendor code so please see me to set up your personal gate code as soon as possible. Another safety issue that we are imposing is that the new gate hours will be 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. If someone is visiting you or you have ordered a repair person before 8:00 a.m. then you can take the responsibility for letting them in and being with them while they are in the community. REMEMBER that someone cannot reach you from the gate unless you have a phone number listed with the office because the "scroll name feature" only operates if a phone number exists. We will also be locking the pool gates


at night at the same time we lock up the clubhouse. This will discourage people coming in from outside and using the pool.

Another issue that has come up is the concern that since ALL has removed new home sales signs from the streets and within the community that residents who are trying to sell their homes will be at a disadvantage. Additional signs are being developed that will let people know that resale homes are still available in the community. ALL is also developing plans to enhance their current marketing approach in selling resale homes. You would need to discuss this approach with the ALL sales team.

To assist everyone who has a home for sale. I am going to provide a display case somewhere in the clubhouse for flyers of homes for sale in case a potential buyer drops by the clubhouse after hours. That way they can contact your agent or you directly, as the case may be.

To wrap up, for safety reasons, I need for you to develop a gate code that lets you in and to provide me with a home phone number so that visitors can access you from the gate. I would also like information on the make, model, and license plate number of your car. This way it is easier for me to identify people who should not be in the community. All these features will assist us in providing a more secure community environment for residents. Thank you so much for your ideas and assistance in helping me meet this goal.
