Low-fat Graham Crackers 8 oz. Fat-free Cream Cheese (softened) 1 cup cold skim milk 2 Tblsp. Lemon Juice 1 small box of instant Vanilla pudding (sugar free)

8 oz Fat-free Cool Whip 1 can of cherry pie filling of any flavor you like


#### **Directions:**

Line the bottom of a 9 X 13 pan with whole Graham Crackers. Beat the Cream Cheese until smooth. Add milk and lemon juice to the cream cheese and beat until smooth. Stir in the pudding mix, then fold in the Cool Whip. Spread 1/2 of the cream cheese mixture of the Graham Crackers. Repeat with another layer of crackers and cream cheese mixture. Spread the pie filling over the top. Refrigerate overnight for the graham crackers to soften. Enjoy!! Makes about 20 servings.

# Arizona History

Hohokam (pronounced ho-ho-kam) is a modern Pima Indian word that means "all used up" or "those who have vanished". The forgotten Americans of pre-Spanish times cremated their dead which inconveniences today's anthropologists and prevents them from forming a clear picture of their physical appearance. The origins of the Hohokam still remain uncertain. Some believe they were descended from the Cochise, but others believe they moved from Mexico.

The Hohokam settled in the Gila River Valley before the beginning of the Christian era in Europe. Their long habitation in this area can

be divided into four periods: Pioneer, Colonial, Sedentary and Classic.

Knowledge of the Pioneer period from about 300 B.C. to A.D. 500 is based on excavations near the Gila River. The people lived in pithouses that were sunk about a foot beneath the ground with pole walls stuffed with brush and mud chinked into the holes. The roofs had rafters of cottonwood or mesquite covered with brush and mud.

They implemented a system of hand-dug, gravity-fed canals to provide irrigation for their crops of corn which supplemented their diet of cactus fruits, mesquite beans, fish, deer and rabbit.

The Colonial period which covered A.D. 500 to A.D. 900 saw an extension of the canals for a total of almost two hundred miles. With their increased ability to raise and store surplus food, games entered the lifestyle of these people. Ball courts were established and the games sound like a cross between football, soccer and hockey with the "ball" made from guayule bush. No hands or feet were allowed to guide the ball, so hips, knees and elbows were used.

The Sedentary period of A.D. 900 to A.D.1200 saw further refinement with people beginning to congregate in villages sometimes enclosed by adobe walls built for protection from marauding tribes.

The potters were making larger more decorative jars and bowls, some with a capacity of thirty gallons. It is thought that the pottery was sold or traded to people from the coastal areas as shell ornaments have been found

In the final or Classic period A.D. 1200 to A.D. 1400 the Hohokam lands were invaded by at least two groups of the northern Pueblo Indians.

The first group were the Salado from the Tonto Basin area and probably moved south because of drought. The second group was the Sinaguans from northern Arizona and came south for the same reasons.

These pueblo dwelling Indians merged with the Hohokam and they lived peacefully. They brought their architecture styles with them and soon there were multi-level structures with many rooms. Their ruins at the Pueblo Grande in Phoenix and the Casa Grande north of Coolidge can still be observed.

The Casa Grande was America's first skyscraper with a total of four stories built around A.D. 1300. At forty feet in height it dominated the landscape and served as a watchtower, it was an "apartment house" with eleven large rooms.

Sometime between A.D. 1400 and A.D. 1450 these communities vanished. Where did they go and why? The Hohokam were skilled workers in stone and clay, but most were deliberately destroyed. The few remnants of their architecture and the amazing canals were almost concealed by the desert sands.

We also take stewardship of the Conewango Creek seriously and offer trash bags to each guest. In return, they get one dollar returned to them for each full bag of litter returned to us — even if it's their own litter. We also sponsor the Creek clean up each fall and are active members of the Conewango Creek Watershed Association.

We offer over 8 canoe/kayak trips not only at an hourly rate but also at an overnight trip rate. If you don't see the trip you want, we will be happy to help you plan out your trip. Who knows? Journey of a life time!

# A Night at Bandera's Bunkhouse by Cyndi Smith




