

Community Worship at Desert Harbor by Pastor Penny Newby



Working with files and folders


Using libraries to access your files and folders

A file is an item that contains information—for example, text or images or music. When opened, a file can look very much like a text document or a picture that you might find on someone's desk or in a filing cabinet. On your computer, files are represented with icons; this makes it easy to recognize a type of file by looking at its icon. Here are some common file icons:



Icons for a few types of files





An empty folder (left); a folder containing files (right)

A folder is a container you can use to store files in. If you had thousands of paper files on your desk, it would be nearly impossible to find any particular file when you needed it. That's why people often store paper files in folders inside a filing cabinet. On your computer, folders work the same way.

Folders can also store other folders. A folder within a folder is usually called a subfolder. You can create any number of subfolders, and each can hold any number of files and additional subfolders.

Using libraries to access your files and folders

When it comes to getting organized, you don't need to start from scratch. You can use libraries, a feature new to this version of Windows, to access your files and folders, and arrange them in different ways. Here's a list of the four default libraries and what they're typically used for:

- Documents library. Use this library to organize and arrange word-processing documents, spreadsheets, presentations, and other text-related files. For more information, see Managing your documents. By default, files that you move, copy, or save to the Documents library are stored in the My Documents folder.
- Pictures library. Use this library to organize and arrange your digital pictures, whether you get them from your camera, scanner, or in e-mail from other people. For more information, see Managing your pictures. By default, files that you move, copy, or save to the Pictures library are stored in the My Pictures folder.
- Music library. Use this library to organize and arrange your digital music, such as songs that you rip from an audio CD or that you download from the Internet. For more information, see Managing your music.
 By default, files that you move, copy, or save to the Music library are stored in the My Music folder.
- Videos library. Use this library to organize and arrange your videos, such as clips from your digital camera or camcorder, or video files that you download from the Internet. For more information, see Managing your videos.
 By default, files that you move, copy, or save to the Videos library are stored in the My Videos folder.

To open the Documents, Pictures, or Music libraries, click the Start button, and then click Documents, Pictures, or Music. you can open common libraries from the Start menu

International Travel with Your Pet

With the holidays over and summer not yet here, now is a good time to think about advanced planning for the upcoming trip you and your pet will be taking. If you haven't thought about taking a trip with your pet, think again. Millions of Americans travel with their pets both locally and internationally and according to an August 2012 TripAdvisor.com survey, 49% of the pet owning public have plans to travel with their pets.

Get some ID

Entrance into many countries requires your pet to have a permanent form of identification. The best form is a microchip placed by your veterinarian. Even if you don't plan to travel anytime soon, every pet should have a microchip to help get them back home if they are lost. If your pet already has a microchip, double check and make sure the registration information is paid and up to date. Inaccurate information in the microchip database prevents animal rescue groups from contacting you when they find your pet.

Do your homework

Research the pet entry requirements for your destination. Every country is different. As a start, review the information provided by the United States Department of Agriculture.

Their website contains both general information and some country-specific information about pet travel. You should also locate information on pet travel on the website of the country you plan to visit. Although you and your pet are simply going on vacation, the information about pet entry requirements may be found under import/export regulations. If you cannot find the information or you need further clarification, call the country's consulate or embassy. The United States Department of State has a listing.

If you find conflicting information about entry requirements, the destination country holds the trump card, so rely on their website and embassy.

Pack the paper

Not newspaper, but your pet's papers. According to TripAdvisor.com, only 45% of pet owners travel with health certificates and rabies documentation. I find this surprising. Keeping your pet's vaccinations up to date and keeping their vaccination certificates on file will help streamline obtaining critical travel documents. Bring copies with you and ask your veterinarian for a summary of your pet's medical conditions and medications.

Important reminders

- Start early. Some countries require your pet to have a special rabies blood test performed. Only certain laboratories perform this test and timing is critical.
- Even though you may have started preparing early for your trip, certain travel documents must be signed only days before departure. Allow time in your schedule to finalize any of your pet's travel documents.
- Some countries require your pet's health papers be signed by a USDA accredited veterinarian. Not all
 veterinarians are accredited, so check with your veterinarian well in advance of your trip to make sure
 you have an appointment with one who can sign the travel papers.

It's important to remember that it's not just international travel that has a lot of paperwork. If you're planning to go to Hawaii then plan for a lot of paperwork and a lot of time. Since Hawaii has no rabies they are extremely strict on rabies titers and vaccinations. It can take six months plus to get a pet prepared to go to Hawaii. Any travel you plan to do, international or just a guick flight, do your homework to be prepared

Book Review by Bob Mayo

Command and Control: Nuclear Weapons, the Damascus Accident and the Illusion of Safety.

Author: Eric Schlosser

This book is a work of non-fiction. It accurately presents the dilemma faced by policy makers as well as military leaders of this country since the dawn of the nuclear age with the atomic test at Trinity Site in New Mexico and the subsequent use of atomic weapons at Hiroshima and Nagasaki which finally brought an end to WWII. The basic issue is one of how to insure that these weapons, a single one of which may have the capacity to wipe out an entire city as well as causing possibly hundreds of thousands of casualties, cannot be stolen, sabotaged, used without proper authorization or detonated inadvertently as a result of an accident. The author provides a detailed history of the efforts of many individuals and agencies along with the problems associated with resolving these issues, due in part to the sometimes competing requirements of the scientists who design the weapons and the military which are the ones who would actually be called upon to deliver them. It also gives a history with many details of major accidents/incidents from the 1940's onward involving nuclear weapons or material.

Interwoven throughout this history is the almost minute by minute account of a major accident involving a Titan II missile with its associated W53 nuclear warhead which occurred outside of Damascus, Arkansas in September 1980. The Titan II was on alert at launch complex 374-7 near Damascus when a maintenance person dropped a socket from a socket wrench which fell about 80 feet and pierced the skin of the first stage fuel tank causing a leak. The leak eventually led to an explosion in the silo which destroyed the complex and hurled the warhead about 100 feet before it came to rest. There was no nuclear detonation and in this instance no release of radiation or of radioactive material. The author accurately recounts the actions of many individuals both at the site and those not at the scene to try to prevent an explosion and to contain the damage should one occur. It describes the actions both good and bad, of the individuals involved in the decision making process along with the often heroic actions of those who tried to prevent the explosion including one airman who died as a result of his injuries.

This is a well researched book and definitely worth reading for anybody having an interest in nuclear weapons and their control and use.
