Meeting Held By Melissa Dougherty March 28, 2014 by Margo Crawford

Melissa Dougherty of Solstice Community's Colorado office requested a community meeting to discuss the continuing issues in the park. She opened the meeting by saying, "We have been doing many things wrong here. We have to take our medicine when we deserve it and our candy when we have earned it."

She acknowledged that the front office here at Desert Harbor has not been covered and open as it should be. They will be searching for a good strong front office assistant who will be thoroughly trained by Sarah Cunningham from Human Resources. Sarah will come here to do the training. Melissa openly admitted that hiring Justine had been a mistake. Art Roberts asked for more details on the remodeling of the kitchen. Melissa confirmed the start date will be in mid-May. The wall to the office hallway will be removed enlarging the kitchen considerably and the electrical will be upgraded in order to meet the needs for our events. The remodel will be done according to a revised version of the blue-prints used at Rancho Mirage. In order to personalize our kitchen to what we would like, they will be providing samples of what is available and taking suggestions from the residents. She requested that we form a committee to help the flow of information and decisions.

Gentry will get a copy of the plans so we can start visualizing what is going to happen.

A resident questioned why it is so difficult to make lot rent payments at the office. The office is to be open 8:00 A. M. to 5:00 P. M. daily and only closed for one hour at lunch. The resident said there has been more than one or two times that she has tried to pay her rent for a period of 5 days and that included trying to pay at the Desert Harbor office, at La Casa Blanca and Rancho Mirage. Again, it comes down to the office not being properly staffed.

Patricia Hall raised the problem of an unqualified person living in the park for over a year with a young child. Why did it take so long to get the problem resolved even though there were many complaints registered with the office during that period of time? She also has problems with people parking and blocking her driveway at all hours. She addressed the issue with one of the people who replied to her, "Well you can always hit my car to get out." She has complained numerous times to the office about the parking problems as her job requires her to be on call and available at all hours. She also mentioned that a suspicious car was driving through the park at 4:00 A. M. She was up and getting ready to go to work and counted the car making 4 passes through the park with no headlights on and the driver using a penlight to see what people have out and around on their property. She did call the police. However, a call to the office and leaving a message prompted no response about the situation.

It seems the gate at the front, Ironwood Dr., entrance was open when it shouldn't be. We seem to have continuous problems with the gates being open when they shouldn't be. The company that maintains the gates and timing mechanisms had been out numerous times to address the issue. However, it was also noted by Gentry Dion that some residents have been observed pushing the gates open and that is causing some of the problems.



Even when Gentry is supposed to be in the office on Wednesday and Thursday of each week it is difficult to actually find him in the office. Melissa stated that there will be an attempt to keep Gentry in the office for the full hours allotted. Perhaps he can send the assistant on errands for him and maybe not schedule property viewings for those two days. There will be a discussion to determine what can be done.

It was also mentioned that he should keep a list of 'renters' available. There was a situation when ballots were being handed out for voting for the new members of the Activities Board since renters are not qualified to vote.

The cleanliness of the clubhouse and the fact that we had to beg just to get the fans cleaned was mentioned.

Frank Kosars asked about the situation with holding potluck dinners and the AZ statute that indicates they are not 'legal'. Tracy explained that this issue has been discussed and basically the thoughts on the matter are that the wording of the statute is poor and will be revised. The city is not prepared to allocate time and resources to shut down potlucks or other social activities in private communities.

Jim Matthews asked when the pool will be officially open for 24 hours 7 days a week. So far all we have been told is bids are still being taken for the work to be done on the bathroom doors. Again, this is a situation that has dragged on since last summer. It shouldn't take this long for something to be done. Melissa promised to follow up on this and have Gentry check in to keyless entries for the pool and the bathrooms. The inner doors of the bathrooms will have to be locked to prevent entry into the clubhouse proper.

Resident comment: People who are in the park looking for a home to purchase have questions about lot rent and etc. They complain that there is never anyone in the office to help them and leaving messages on the phone service get no reply.

Statements for the lot rent are allowed to accumulate in the cubbies. It should be apparent that they aren't being picked up. This would be an indication to anyone who walks through the clubhouse that the property is not currently inhabited. Please figure out a better way to handle the statements. Make certain that the ones intended for our Winter Visitors are mailed to them and not just left.

Sherry Weinert stated that we have been requesting security cameras for a long time. Too many items go missing from the clubhouse. This includes some of the recent decorations that were made for our events. Melissa expressed her lack of enthusiasm for security cameras. The new kitchen cabinets will be made of solid wood and they can have locks on them to help prevent kitchen theft.

Betty Cuevas requested that there be a follow up to the problem with the hole in her yard. The park landscaper, at the time, said it would be taken care of. To this date it has not been properly filled in. Gentry promised to come by and check it out and have it taken care of.

Tim Chrissis took a moment to thank Tracy for all the events she has brought to the park. She is doing a great job. There is a dead Fichus tree by the park entrance. It has been there for years and isn't coming back. Why hasn't the park taken care of it? Melissa explained that at first they thought all trees were the responsibility of the house owners. It has since been brought to their attention that the Fichus trees along the entry drive are the responsibility of the park and management. Gentry stated he would have Tony take care of the tree on the following Wednesday, April 2nd. Connie Farmer asked for and got an answer for the use of the term, 'basic water fee'. It is used to cover the fee for the 'delivery' of the water. Melissa explained that the company is not allowed to charge any other fee other than exactly what they are charged.

Sherry Weinert commented that she had requested Gentry to make an inspection of the park and check all properties for weeds and other violations. Gentry replied that he had made an initial inspection and talked to several people who were home. Other people will be receiving letters about the problems with their lots.

Bruno Borowczyk said that the tree close to his house but that is park responsibility, has grown into and is interfering with the electrical box. There is also a dead cactus that has been down for a long time and should be cleaned up. Linda asked if the golf course area would ever be finished. Another project that was done this past summer and not finished correctly. Gentry apologized once again for the problems with the golf course. He is still checking for a contractor to help in maintaining it and exactly what kind of grass is suitable for the putting greens etc.

Connie Riter pointed out that the streets are still in need of repair. Nothing has been done in years. I followed up Connie's comment by telling Melissa that the last work that was done was late 2009 or early 2010. The angle or slope of the streets was done incorrectly and now they flood worse than ever. The parking spaces along the front of the clubhouse flood 2-3" deep or more when it rains. The sidewalk along the front side of the clubhouse also floods.

A comment was made about the weeds that are growing all along the sides of the golf course. Who is responsible for getting rid of the weeds? They look terrible. There is also a large hole developing by the drive apron to the golf course. It needs to be filled and maintained. Gentry is aware of the hole and will get it taken care of in a nice, presentable manor.

We are having major problems with illegal parking and overnight parking and boats and trailers remaining on the streets overnight for weeks at a time. Gentry promised to make more thorough trips around the park to observe these things. Admittedly his rides through the park have been on a limited basis. Fran asked that another dead cactus be removed. Mickie Kosars asked why the dog run area is always flooded and voiced concern about the golf carts creating deep ruts when you drive them to the dog run area. It seems the sprinkler system is the cause of the flooding. This will be added to the agenda and followed up on to see what can be done. Tony is responsible for the landscaping around the common areas only. The contracted landscaper will be doing the golf course landscaping.

Hans stated that Tony needs some decent tools. Melissa stated that \$2,000.00 was allocated for tools for Tony while Bonnie was the manager. Melissa will now check with Tony and Gentry to figure out how that money was spent and what Tony still needs. She also agreed that a leaf blower shouldn't be too big of an expense to be purchased immediately.

Cliff Tessmer wanted to know if the horse shoe pits would be corrected and brought up to game standards. Or would it be better to change it to a Bocce Ball court. These suggestions will be taken into consideration. Cliff will check into information for expenses etc. for either setup to be done. We also need to have scoreboards out by the shuffleboard courts

Another resident questioned the ability of management to balance the hours billed and hours paid. She expressed concern that \$2,000.00 was allocated for new tools but no-one knows how the money was spent. Melissa had also commented that money is allocated each year for pool repairs and road maintenance. If this is true why has it been since 2010 and no additional road repairs have been done.

Tim Chrissis mentioned, along with others, that the cracks across our roads are spreading out in angles from the original crack and potholes are starting to develop. The longer this situation is allowed to remain unattended the worse it will get and will be more and more expensive to repair. The meeting adjourned shortly after 10:00 A. M. as Melissa had a plane to catch.

I, for one, was very pleased with the number of residents who were able to attend the meeting. I know all our questions and complaints weren't addressed but hopefully our recent community effort to get attention drawn to the neglect in Desert Harbor will get things started. We will have to continue to believe that they will follow up on their promises in a positive and timely manner.

Bertha's Beans by Midge Drouin

Hi, I'm Bertha Harris in Lot#180. Since the Canadians hosted the hoedown, I have had many requests for my "Baked Beans" recipe. I hope everyone enjoys it as much as our family does. This is a recipe of my creation. So here it goes:

- 1 can of pineapple "tidbits" (20 oz) with juice
- 3 tbsp of brown sugar
- 1 cup of ketchup
- 1 med onion-chopped
- 1 red pepper-chopped
- 1 green pepper-chopped or 4 small red/ yellow/or orange peppers

Mix all the above ingredients in a medium sized saucepan. Bring to a boil, then simmer until onions become transparent approx. 5-10 min.

While sauce is simmering open 3 cans of beans. You may use 1 can of kidney beans and 2 cans of pork & beans. Drain excess juice from the beans. Put beans in a larger sized sauce pan. When sauce is done and onions are

transparent, pour sauce over the beans and heat all ingredients. Or if you wish you may cool the sauce and have cold beans. This sauce can be used for 1 can of beans. Please note that any leftover sauce can be frozen and used at a later date. Hope you all enjoy this recipe as much as I did creating it.

HEALTH ARTICLE by Midge Drouin

Eye Problems, Noninjury - Topic Overview

Many people have minor eye problems, such as eyestrain, irritated eyes, or itchy, scaly eyelids. These problems may be ongoing but usually are not serious. Home treatment can relieve the symptoms of many minor eye problems.

Common types of eye problems include:

- Drainage from the eyes or excessive tearing.
- Eyestrain or vision changes.
- Misaligned eyes or strabismus (sometimes called cross-eyes).
- Blood in the white of the eye (subconjunctival hemorrhage).
- Eyelid problems.
- Contact lens problems.
- Color blindness.
- · Night blindness.
- Glaucoma.
- Cataracts.
- Retinal problems, such as diabetic retinopathy.
- Red eyes that may be caused by infection, inflammation, or tumors.
- Uveitis.
- Macular degeneration.

It is common for the eyes to be irritated or have a scratchy feeling. Pain is not a common eye problem unless there has been an injury. It is not unusual for the eyes to be slightly sensitive to light. But sudden, painful sensitivity to light is a serious problem that may mean glaucoma or inflammation of the muscles that control the pupil and should be evaluated by your doctor.

Sudden problems such as new vision changes, pain in the eye, or increased drainage are often more serious and need to be evaluated by a doctor. Eye symptoms that are new or that occur suddenly may be evaluated by an emergency medicine specialist.

Ongoing (chronic) eye problems that may be worsening are usually evaluated by an eye doctor (ophthalmologist). A gradual change in your vision or chronic eye problems may include:

- Vision changes. These may include:
 - Trouble adjusting your vision when entering a dark room.
 - Trouble focusing on close or faraway objects.
 - Dark spots in the center of your vision field.
 - Lines or edges that appear wavy.
 - Evelid problems, such as a sty or chalazion (a small, hard lump).
 - Discharge or irritation of the eyeball or eyelids, such as an infection of the inner edge of the lower eyelid
 or pinkeye
 - · Sensitivity to light
 - Inability to see well at night (night blindness). A decrease in night vision may be caused by nearsightedness, cataracts, macular degeneration, or conditions that affect the retina.

People often tolerate minor eye irritation and problems for a long time, until the irritation or problems become bothersome enough to seek care. People who have skin problems and allergies often have ongoing minor problems with the skin of their eyelids and allergic irritation of the eyes.

As you reach your 40s and 50s, it is common to have some vision changes and possibly to need glasses. Some of the changes may also cause other symptoms, like headaches and nausea, that affect your ability to function.

Some children may have special risks for eye problems. Vision screening is recommended for infants who were either born at or before 30 weeks, whose birthweight was below 3.3 lb (1500 g), or who have serious medical conditions. Most vision problems are noticed first by the parents. Check your symptoms to decide if and when you should see a doctor

Christopher was a straight "A" student with aspirations of attending an Ivy League university. His goal was to get a prestigious degree and earn "lots" of money. When he found out he would have to spend his junior and senior year of high school in South America, he was understandably upset. He thought we were taking this "God" and "Jesus" thing a little too far.

Soooo, I made a deal with him that if he would spend one year with us in Venezuela, I would make arrangements for him to come back to Pennsylvania (our home state) in order to graduate with his original classmates. Although he wasn't thrilled with the idea of leaving in the first place, he at least had a way out of the "crazy" thing we were doing. (Some of our family members thought we were crazy too, but that's another story.)

The first few months in Venezuela were greeted by grumpiness on his part which gave way to tolerance which finally gave way to acceptance. Also, his perception of his responsibility to others in need changed dramatically.

Long story short, he attended Wheaton College and is now a social worker in Chicago, Illinois. He still reminds us (Barb and me) that his poverty lifestyle is all our fault but I know that he knows he is exactly where God wants him to be.
