

Summary of the Residents' Meeting by Connie Riter

A residents' meeting was held on Nov. 1, 2014 with about 50 people in attendance. Ken opened the meeting with the Pledge of Allegiance and introduced two new residents in attendance -- Jerry and Laurie Gaston #129. All Board Members were present for this meeting. The October minutes were on the tables, and it was brought up that the report should include the balance in the treasurer's report. The minutes will be amended to include this information, and they were approved as amended. The treasurer's report was approved as written after some questions about the balancing of the report in October. Art Roberts indicated that it was correct the way it was written. The October report indicated a total balance of \$2,444.73 -- \$1950.60 in savings, \$423.49 in checking, and \$70.64 in petty cash.

Connie spoke on the Coyote Coupon book sales, indicating that if we sell 20 more, the activities committee will make \$500. Midge spoke on the upcoming Patio Sale on November 8th. Sherry spoke on the Halloween Party indicating that there were about 70 in attendance. Midge mentioned that the upcoming planned Casino night has to sell 65 tickets or the event will be canceled. She said they need to sell 30 more by this Wednesday, Nov. 5th.

Dave asked that residents who use the clubhouse for a private event return it to the same condition it was in when they came in. He also said that the minutes of the meetings and the treasurer's report will be posted on the board each month so people can read them before the meeting. The pop machine purchase has been postponed indefinitely. He also said that there would be new Bingo games and each game will cost a quarter, except the last which will be a dollar.

The Thanksgiving Dinner will be a potluck held at the usual time, on November 22 -- with the committee cooking the turkeys and the residents bringing everything else. Tracey has agreed to give us \$100 for the purchase of the turkeys. Any phone numbers and e-mail changes should be given to Dick Smith. Colleen Kitzman is working with the school again and wants residents to save cereal box tops (any kind) and Campbell Soup labels for them. She will also have the Christmas tree again this year for people to purchase gifts for children in need.

Greg Gaston, #129, spoke on privacy and property. He said many people are cutting "in between" the lots to get to the pool. He has already spoken to Brianna and wants to remind everyone not to cut through. Art mentioned that we do not have a working emergency number. When problems arise on weekends, as they often do, and you call the emergency number, it just rings in the office and no one answers it. We had two problems this weekend -- water at the hot tub and a nest of bees.

Sherry spoke on the results of the Halloween Party. Felicia Hightower won the \$100 gift certificate for the best pumpkin. Carol Rysavy brought up a discussion of the new proposal to use debit cards. The original proposal had a wording error and new ballots would be distributed with the correction. Tim explained that the use of the debit card has a limit of \$200, and only the president, vice-president, and treasurer would have use of the card. This use will be easier than writing checks and allow for better record keeping. Also, we have to pay for checks. All votes should be placed in the ballot box in the clubhouse and will be counted after (or during) the December meeting.

Renee Spears spoke on the New Year's Eve party which will have music, dancing, food, drawings, and a "talent contest" Tickets will be sold in advance for \$12.00 each and none will be sold at the door. The last day to purchase a ticket would be Dec. 20th. The New Year's Eve committee consists of Renee Spears, Pat Ballock, and Felicia Hightower.

The 50/50 raffle was won by Mike Bauschard and he won \$35.00 The meeting was adjourned at 9:45 am.

YOUR HAIR

Attack on Hair Follicles

In alopecia areata, your immune system mistakenly attacks hair follicles, causing hair to fall out -often suddenly. Most people will have one or two bald patches, but in some cases all body hair falls
out. Alopecia areata isn't harmful or contagious, but it can be tough psychologically. Hair may grow
back on its own, and treatment may help it grow back more quickly. Unfortunately, some people may
experience alopecia areata repeatedly.

Genes Cause 90% of Male Hair Loss

Though hereditary, the trait may be more influenced by your mother's family than your father's. So a look at your maternal grandfather's locks may give you a better clue about the future of yours. Male pattern baldness often starts with receding hair at the temples, then on the crown, leaving a horse-shaped ring of hair around the sides of the head. Medications to slow hair loss include Rogaine (minoxidil) and Propecia (finasteride).

Female-Pattern Baldness

Hair loss in women may mean hair thinning all over the head, but is usually most common on top of the head. Unlike men, women rarely go bald, and they tend to lose hair more slowly than men do. Contrary to popular belief, longer hair won't put a strain on the roots, causing more to fall out. Nor will shampooing pull hair out -- it just gets the ones that were falling out already. Minoxidil may help hair growth and prevent thinning.

Avoid Sun Damage to Hair

Too much sun can turn your hair into a brittle, dry mop that breaks and splits easily. And if you already have thinning hair, you risk a sunburn on your scalp. Choosing hair care products with sunscreen provides some protection, although it can be hard to coat your hair evenly. That's why it's a good idea to wear a hat when you're out in the sun -- especially if your scalp is exposed.

Luscious Locks Need Nutrients

Could a crash diet cost you your hair? In extreme cases, it could. Your hair needs protein and iron to stay healthy, along with omega-3 fatty acids, zinc, and vitamin A, but not too much -- which can promote hair loss. Very low-cal diets are often lacking in sufficient nutrients and can stunt hair growth or leave hair dull and limp. If the nutritional deficiency is big enough -- like for someone with an eating disorder -- hair can fall out.

A Hair- and Heart-Healthy Diet

Help keep hair shiny by eating salmon and walnuts for omega-3 fatty acids; spinach and carrots for vitamin A; brazil nuts for selenium; and oysters and cashews for zinc. All help maintain scalp and hair health, as do low-fat dairy, whole grains, and vegetables. Double the results: foods good for your hair are also good for your heart.



If you like the Saguaro Cactus go take pictures! Find a good one and take several pictures from different angles. Take a few close ups and some intermediate in distance and some at a distance.
