Angi began her meeting by apologizing for taking so long to get anything done here. But she said she has finally hired someone to help out at Casa Blanca so she will be spending more time here. Regarding the kitchen, they will be putting up a wall with a serving window and a door. We will be allowed to keep the cabinets we have. The kitchen should be completely finished by the end of August.

The furniture for the TV corner in the clubhouse will be delivered on Monday, June 20<sup>th</sup>. (and it was!) She has the cash on hand to buy the barbecue grill and the other TV we want above the fireplace. The bathrooms are still being worked on because she still needs to select the mirrors. The palm trees planted on the front road into the park are dying. She will talk to Barry about watering more.

Dogs should always be on a leash in the Park, except when they are in their designated Dog Park area. She got a quote on replacing the clubhouse floor of \$19,000. No decision made.

The outer walls facing the inside of peoples' property will NOT be painted. She thought they would be, but upper management said "No." The kitchen will have stainless counter tops and a "wall of sinks" used for various purposes. No new cleaning service has been selected. Angi and Barry will continue for now.

Tim Chrissis asked about the rocks she has been promising between houses. She said a load of rocks was delivered to the golf course and she will continue getting more.

Someone mentioned the inspection now being required for selling your home. She said that was correct. It is at the owner's expense and costs \$25 if being sold through Sun and \$50 if you have an outside community selling it. Fran asked about classes for the defibrillator. She said she would like to hold off on this until the winter visitors return, but she will see if the fire department could come now.

They are not going to replace the Activities Director (Tracey) right now. Angi said she will check on getting the drainage areas by the golf course cleaned out before the monsoons. Lifetime leases will continue to be honored until the original owners are no longer here. These leases are not transferable to other family members.

We had an incident when both gates were shut down and another when a resident had a serious water leak outside. It took over ½ hour to reach someone at the Call Center for help. She's not sure how to correct this problem.

Angi said she will see about getting donuts and coffee for her next meeting.

## Slow Cooker Lasagna Soup

*made by Carol Rysavy for Ladies' Luncheon*

1 lb. ground beef or Italian Sausage  
1 medium yellow onion, diced  
3 or 4 cloves of garlic, finely chopped  
1 can tomato sauce (16 oz)  
1 can crushed tomatoes, undrained. (26 oz)  
1 carton (32 oz) Progresso beef flavored broth  
2 cups sliced mushrooms  
1 tablespoon dried basil leaves  
1 tablespoon dried parsley  
1 cup water  
½ teaspoon salt  
¼ teaspoon pepper  
1 cup uncooked bow-tie pasta (2 oz)  
2 cups chopped zucchini  
Shredded cheese, if desired

### Directions:

In 10-in skillet, cook beef and onion medium high heat stirring frequently, until beef is brown. Drain. Place in 6 quart slow cooker. Add garlic, tomatoes, tomato sauce, broth, mushrooms, basil, parsley, water, salt and pepper to slow cooker, stir. Cover and cook on low for 7 to 8 hours. When about 30 minutes are left, add uncooked pasta and zucchini. Cover and continue cooking until time is up. Top with shredded cheese if desired.

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## Cool Yogurt Smoothie *by M. Drouin*

Ingredients: 1 container (6oz) strawberry low-fat yogurt  
1 3/4 cups thawed cool whip free whipped topping (divided)  
2 cups fresh strawberries  
2 cups of ice cubes

Directions: Place yogurt, 1 1/2 cups of the whipped topping, strawberries, and ice in blender; blend until smooth. Pour into 4 glasses, top each with 1 tablespoon of the remaining whipped topping. Serve immediately.

### **Its Mosquito Season: The 411 on Repellents**

Thwack. They're baaaack. Yep, it's mosquito season again.

It's not just about itchy bumps, either -- mosquito bites can make you sick, especially if you're traveling. Think Zika, chikungunya, West Nile, dengue, or even malaria or yellow fever if you're going to some parts of Africa.

That means you need some insect repellent -- but surprisingly, lots of people don't use it. An April 2016 survey done by market research firm TNS Global found that only about half of Americans (49%) follow the CDC's recommendation to use a mosquito repellent.

Zika poses a particular danger to pregnant women, since it causes birth defects. As it creeps northward from South America and the Caribbean, health officials' mission is to get the message out loud and clear: Mosquito repellents are safe, and you should use them.

And there are more choices than ever. The product that's right for you will depend on why you need it. Are you pregnant or traveling to an area with a lot of mosquito-borne disease? Are you fishing or camping and handling lots of gear? Are you applying it to a young child's skin? All those things should factor into your buying decision.

We reached out to mosquito experts for advice on choosing and using these products. Here are their rules for making mosquito repellents work for you.

What's the best active ingredient? According to the CDC and EPA, there are four ingredients to look for: DEET, picaridin, oil of lemon eucalyptus or PMD, and IR3535.

DEET is the granddaddy of bug stoppers. It was developed by the U.S. military in 1946, and it's the most widely used and studied active ingredient out there. It's long gotten a bad rap as a scary chemical, but experts say that reputation isn't justified, even for pregnant women. Extremely high doses have, on rare occasions, caused nervous system problems like seizures, tremors, and slurred speech, though, so it's still worth handling with care.

It's found in products like Off! Deep Woods spray, Sawyer's Ultra 30 Insect Repellent lotion, and 3M's Ultrathon Insect Repellent lotions and sprays.

**A Hero in Our Midst** by Connie Riter

Last month, the National Sheriffs Association which numbers almost 3100 sheriffs and 20,000 law enforcement professionals, awarded our own Jim Stephens its "2016 Chaplain of the Year Award." A formal ceremony was held at the Pinal County Sheriff's Office on June 13<sup>th</sup> where Chaplain Stephens was presented with his award by Sheriff Paul Babeu. Sheriff Babeu stated, "*Chaplain Jim Stephens never expected recognition and certainly not this national award since he's always helped others out of love for his fellow man. Jim's always there to listen, offer encouragement and prayer when we need it most. Jim's been a gift from God to support our staff and help us care for those we meet on emergency calls who need spiritual support. We are all so proud of this national recognition for Jim.*"

Chaplain Stephens became a volunteer member of the Pinal County Sheriff's Office, Victim's Services Unit 8 years ago. The VSU is a civilian group of staff and volunteers created to assist victims of crime and support law enforcement. Victim's service chaplains are on call to provide aid, comfort, assistance and resources to victims, witnesses and survivors of crime. The unit consists of six volunteer chaplains from various religious backgrounds, who respond to calls when needed. Chaplain Stephens has a 20-year background in law enforcement. He draws on his extensive law enforcement background to connect with deputies that may be having trouble coping with stressful or traumatic incidents. He finds comfort in providing faith-based counseling to law enforcement officers and crime victims alike.

Chaplain Stephens keeps busy outside of his chaplain service by volunteering for his church and works for the elderly as the County's Triad Coordinator. Triad is a nationwide concept supported by the NSA for organizing community resources to help provide a safer environment for older adults. The group is made up of community representatives who implement programs and activities to help the county's elderly. As Coordinator he has expanded the county's lock-box program and the use of first-responder medical alert cards. These programs provide a safer home environment for the handicapped and elderly to remain independent. He also coordinates a group of volunteers who do light handiwork for the elderly who are not physically able to perform simple home maintenance. In accepting the award, Chaplain Stephens stated, "*I am honored and humbled to receive this award. I want to thank Sheriff Paul for nominating me for this prestigious recognition. It is a privilege to serve PCSO and this county and I look forward to finding new and better ways to serve.*"
