St. Patrick’s Day St. Patrick’s Day is celebrated on March 17, his religious feast day, and the anniversary of his death in the fifth century. The Irish have observed this day as a religious holiday for thousands of years. On St. Patrick’s Day, which falls during the Christian season of Lent, Irish families would traditionally attend church in the morning and celebrate in the afternoon. Lenten prohibitions against the consumption of meat were waived and people would dance, drink, and feast on the traditional meal of Irish bacon and cabbage. The first St. Patrick’s Day parade took place not in Ireland, but in the United States. Irish soldiers serving in the English military marched through New York City on March 17, 1762. Along with their music, the parade helped the soldiers to reconnect with their Irish roots, as well as fellow Irishmen serving in the English army. Over the next thirty-five years, Irish patriotism among American immigrants flourished, prompting the rise of the so-called “Irish Aid” societies, like the Friendly Sons of Saint Patrick and the Hibernian Society. Each group would hold annual parades featuring bagpipes (which actually first became popular in the Scottish and British armies) and drums. In 1948, President Truman attended New York City’s St. Patrick’s Day parade, a proud moment for the many Irish whose ancestors had to fight stereotypes and racial prejudice to find acceptance in America. Today, St. Patrick’s Day is celebrated by people of all backgrounds in the United States, Canada, and Australia. In modern-day Ireland, St. Patrick’s Day has traditionally been a religious occasion. In fact, up until the 1970s, Irish laws mandated that pubs be closed on March 17th. Beginning in 1995, however, the Irish government began a national campaign to use St. Patrick’s Day as an opportunity to drive tourism and showcase Ireland to the rest of the world. In Ireland, St. Patrick’s Day is a multi-day celebration featuring parades, concerts, outdoor theater productions, and fireworks shows.

Summary of February 3, 2018 Residents Meeting

Dave Borchardt mentioned the Super Bowl party tomorrow starting at 4:30 pm. Pizza will be provided by Sun Community, but everyone should bring a snack to share and their own drinks. **Barb Nienkark** spoke on "fun days" which are only 5 weeks away. Under Special Order: Bob mentioned guest charges. The Board voted to stop charging for guests at our Pot Lucks – just bring extra food when you will be bringing guests. As for the \$10 entertainment charge for guests, we voted to keep it. At the Ron Cash night, we had 8 guests, 4 paid, 4 did not. You are only hurting the Park residents if you refuse to pay for guests.....please be thoughtful. Then Bob mentioned the other upcoming activities: the cribbage tournament, the steel drum band, Bernie and Red, and the Free Bingo on the 19th.

Under New Business: The nominating committee, consisting of Becky, Linda, and Leroy had no nominations. Bob explained what would happen if we didn't get any members willing to volunteer. The Board would be dissolved and all activities would cease. He then asked for nominations from the floor. For **member at large**, someone nominated **Bonnie Harrison** – she accepted it. No one else volunteered. For **Vice President** which has to be a full-time resident, two people were nominated: **Dave Blomeyer and Bruce Wicken**. Both accepted the nomination, so ballots will need to be printed. For **President**, **Dave Borchardt** was nominated and he accepted. No one else offered to run, so he will be president. The **audit** will be performed this year by **Jerry Dilley and Connie Farmer**. The 50/50 was won by **Agnes Olson** who received **\$68.00**.

For some of us, T'ai Chi can be very relaxing. So give yourself the opportunity to treat your body, mind, and spirit to better wellness.



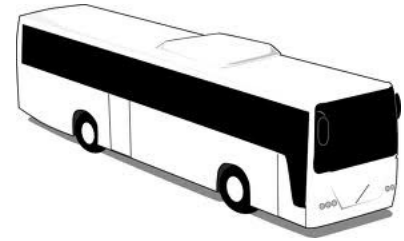
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BUS TRIPS *by Connie Riter*

Sean and the Volcano Island Steel Drum Band

The Volcano Steel Drum band played for Desert Harbor residents on Valentine's day February 14th. There were about 85 people in attendance.

The band has played for Governors, Mayors and even Alice Cooper. Also a lot of baseball teams such as Chicago Cubs, California Angels and many more.

Sean has been performing since he was 14 years old. He studied at ASU. He plays tenor pan steel drums, the double-second steel drums, double-guitar steel drums, ukulele, marimba, vibes, timpani, drum set, congas and numerous Latin instruments.

He explained to all of us about what steel drums are. They are 55 gallon drums or oil barrels that have been hammered and shaped by hand into musical instruments. They originated from the Caribbean Island of Trinidad in the early 50's, often have a chrome finish, can range in price from \$500 to \$5,000. And must be re-tuned regularly.

All had a wonderful time being entertained by the Volcano Island Band.

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INFORMATION

- GARBAGE** Picked up every Monday and Thursday morning (please don't put your food garbage out the night before because the Coyotes love to rip it open). If one of the following holidays falls on a Monday or Thursday, the garbage will be picked up one day later:
Independence Day, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day, New Year's Day
- RECYCLE** We have dumpsters located on the west side of the clubhouse. There is one yellow color container for paper and cardboard. We get money for the paper and cardboard so PLEASE use it as it helps the Activity Club's treasury. The blue recycle dumpster is for plastic, glass and all other recycle items. We do not get any money for these two containers, but please recycle as much as you can.
