# A Bit of History by Connie Riter

If you don't like history, you may want to skip over this article this month because it is on the history of the celebrations surrounding July 4<sup>th</sup>. During the American Revolution, the legal separation of the thirteen colonies from Great Britain occurred on July 2, 1776 when the Second Continental Congress approved a resolution of independence that had been proposed in June by Richard Henry Lee of Virginia declaring the US independent from Great Britain. After voting for independence, Congress turned its attention to the Declaration of Independence, a statement explaining this decision, which had been prepared by a committee of five, with Thomas Jefferson as its principal author. Congress debated and revised the wording of the Declaration, finally approving it on July 4<sup>th</sup>.

A day earlier, John Adams had written to his wife Abigail: "The second day of July, 1776, will be the most memorable epoch in the history of America. I am apt to believe that it will be celebrated by succeeding generations as the great anniversary festival. It ought to be commemorated as the day of deliverance, by solemn acts of devotion to God Almighty. It ought to be solemnized with pomp and parade, with shows, games, sports, guns, bells, bonfires, and illuminations, from one end of this continent to the other, from this time forward forever more."

From the outset, Americans celebrated independence on July 4, the date shown on the much-publicized Declaration of Independence, rather than on July 2, the date the resolution of independence was approved in a closed session of Congress. Historians have long disputed whether Congress actually signed the Declaration of Independence on July 4<sup>th</sup>. Most have concluded that it was signed nearly a month after its adoption, on August 2, 1776.

In a remarkable coincidence, both John Adams and Thomas Jefferson, both signers of the Declaration to later serve as Presidents died on the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the signing -- July 4, 1826. In 1777, 13 gunshots were fired in commemoration in Rhode Island. Philadelphia celebrated the first anniversary in a way similar to the way it is celebrated today -- with fireworks, speeches, parades, music, prayers, and toasts. In 1778 General George Washington marked the 4<sup>th</sup> of July by giving his soldiers a double ration of rum and an artillery salute. Over the years, the political importance of the holiday may have declined, but Independence Day remains an important national holiday and a symbol of patriotism. However you celebrate it, find some way to make this a special day, and to think of all the freedoms we enjoy here in the United States of America.

Picture it! The year is 1971; a 29 year old man sits in the basement with a recently purchased set of carving knives. Maybe it was a latent desire to whittle like his Boy Scout leader at Camp Sequoia in the 1950's that possessed him to spend the \$1. In his scrap box he found a 4" x 5" piece of pine with paint spatters on one side that would work. But, what to carve? He thought back to his younger years, two older siblings and he (12, 10 & 8) were responsible for the family garden. Many things grew there, mostly he remembered the weeds, gasoline drenched potato beetles and the three preteens sweating under droopy cowboy hats. Maybe that would work as a carving idea. How about the hours that were consumed playing "Cowboys and Indians"—that could work as well. From those thoughts he carved a relief of a cowboy with a droopy hat from the "good old days". That cowboy hung on our wall for 40 years—who would have thought he would end up in Arizona. In 2011 I did my second carving and Judith her first. We have been carving for seven years. Judith's first carving was a jointed Yakama doll and I did an Indian war pony—both earned blue ribbons and we were hooked. We have attained expert status and would like to pass some of our knowledge to park members.

Learning and practicing the techniques, being patient and enjoying the social time (and maybe a donut or two)—I believe you could find it all very rewarding. It is the best feeling in the world to give a piece of your art work to your kids, grandkids or friends. They turn your carving over and your name is on the back. How cool is that! 
