This is the last month of having to watch countless campaign commercials, too! Here in Arizona, we have seen the end of the monsoons with their haboobs and torrential rains. Our dog park has finally returned to the dogs and we can begin preparing for Christmas (the stores are way ahead of us on this!)

Now that the weather is cooler, it is a good time to visit some of the unique places here in Arizona. "Leaf peeping" in the white mountains is a lovely Sunday excursion where you can see the Gamble oaks and Aspen trees turning yellow and orange during the first three weeks of the month. Go visit the spooks at Old Tucson Studios. This is a year-round attraction that offers Halloween themed scariness in October. The annual State Fair also begins in mid-October and offers a variety of artists, rodeos, Native American cultural events, etc. You can even enter one of the competitions they have in cooking, photography, science, or home arts. Arizona is home to over 100 ghost towns, some of which include hauntings in Oatman, Jerome, Goldfield, and Whiskey Row. What fun it would be to visit a few, and perhaps run into a "real ghost!" Flagstaff also is a wonderful city to visit now, to see places such as Sunset Crater Volcano, Walnut Canyon, and Wupatki National Monument. You can also see the changing trees on the 1.8 mile hike known as the Aspen Nature Loop. Or...head south to the Tucson area to see an Old West Town, Tombstone, with its history of gunslingers, OK Corral shootout, and Boothill cemetery. If you prefer something more "romantic," plan a trip to Sedona and walk on one of the many trails there and in Oak Creek Canyon. Perhaps you will be lucky enough to "experience a vortex" there. You can also take a tour of Bearizona near Williams, on your way to the Grand Canyon....They have special events there, too, during October.

Whatever you do, try to spend more time outdoors seeing some of the beauty of our State.....

## Summary of Sept. Residents Meeting

**Dave Borchardt** began our monthly meeting at 9:00am leading us in the Pledge of Allegiance. There were about 50 residents present. Dave then took roll call of the Board, noting that Bonnie Harrison and Richard Lewis were absent since they have not returned from their summer homes. He then asked if there were any new residents and there were three. **Betty Zaslewsky** (lot 159) who moved here from LaQuinta, California; **Howard and Jan Beemer** (lot 193) from Gilbert; and **Clara and Bob Corner** (196) from Missouri. Dave welcomed them to the Park.

The minutes were approved as written. The treasurer's report had some discussion. **Art Roberts** indicated that the paper bin was completely full yesterday, yet he saw no place on the report which showed any funds coming from the Paper Collecting Company. Richard said he called them and was told that we will received a check "within the week" and that was 8 days ago. He said he can do nothing more than call. **Judy Childers** asked about the Wi-Fi charge since she hadn't noticed it on any reports before. Dave informed her that this is for a Website Hosting Fee paid once per year because **Dick Smith** keeps the account for posting information from the Park. The Park management provides the Wi-Fi for the Clubhouse. The treasurer's report was then accepted as written.

**Under Committee Reports**, **Connie** mentioned the soup n salad luncheon this Tuesday and the Lunch Out of the Park on the third Thursday where we are going to the Olive Mill in Queen Creek. Both sign up sheets are available. **LaVonne**, standing in for Carol for the library, asked if people were interested in having a jig saw puzzle in the library to work on. Nothing was decided.

**Dave** explained the **Football Pool** which starts this week. It costs \$3 per week and you can fill out your form and put it in his cubby (#142) or bring it to his home. If you don't want to pay, you would not be eligible for the money, but you can still play for a gift card. No one has yet to have the winning number and not be playing for money.

Betty Cuevas brought up an incident which occurred at a recent event where she brought guests to a dinner. She had given the guest money to Connie in advance, who turned it in to Richard. But when Betty came to the dinner, a person sitting near her held out her hand and said, "you have guests – where is your money?" Betty was offended as well as her guests since they had already paid. A better system of collecting money for guests needs to be addressed. After some discussion, it was agreed that Richard Granata would collect the money in advance and issue a ticket for each guest. When arriving at the Clubhouse for dinner, with the ticket, the ticket would be torn partially and returned to the owner who would place the ticket on their table during dinner so everyone knows they have paid for their guests.

Cami thanked Karen Kroschel for taking care of the new residents while Cami was on vacation. "You did a good job!" Linda Edwards mentioned that water volleyball official time is once per week, on Wednesdays from 10 til noon. They play at other times, too, depending on the people present.

The **Individual Patio Sale** will be held this year on Nov. 10<sup>th</sup>, from 7 until 1 pm. Hamburgers and Hot Dogs will be sold. Cami asked about **Entertainment**. Dave said we have been overwhelmed and haven't had time to organize any. Cami offered to chair a committee to take charge of the entertainment and found 4 perhaps more people who offered to work with her.

The 50/50 raffle was won by **Rose Chrissis** who received \$33.00. A \$20 Fry's gift card was won by Dave Borchardt and a \$10 Starbuck's card was won by Paul Barker. The meeting adjourned at 9:55 am.



## The Schupbachs Adventure to the Schupbachs

My friend says to me, "I'm renting a villa for the month of September in Italy—why don't you come over?" Needless to say, I didn't have to think twice and said "OK!" And that was the be-



ginning of the adventure. We had always wanted to go to Switzerland and Germany to visit the towns of Schupbach there, and this was going to be the opportunity to do that. Jim and Karen Stephens picked us up to take us to Sky Harbor for our flight to Dulles in DC where we boarded another flight to Rome which landed the next morning. From the Rome airport we took a train to the main Rome terminus and got on a train to Naples. Lots of trains in Europe! We had purchased a Eurail pass knowing we would be using the rails to get to the many places we planned to visit. We were meeting my friend and her niece there on Friday morning and then going to tour the Amalfi Coast and the Isle of Capri.

Our hotel was about .4 mile from the train station. But we walked about 1.5 miles trying to find the place while each of us were dragging our 45 pound luggage over the cobblestone sidewalks and sweating like pigs. Three people we asked for directions gave us three different ways to go. Finally we asked a cabbie who laughed and said, "It's right around the corner." We were hungry on arrival at the Hotel San Pietro and decided to grab a bite and then go back to get some sleep since my friend hadn't arrived yet. On the way to find a restaurant, we passed her on the street! What's the likelihood of that in a foreign city? We decided to meet in the morning to begin our tour. After breakfast, we met at the Star Terminus to board a bus for the Amalfi coast.

**THE AMALFI COAST** is between the Gulf of Naples and the Salerno Gulf. It is a designated UNESCO World Heritage site due to its beauty. The road takes us through many tunnels, past Mt. Vesuvius and through the town of Ravello, Positano, Sorrento, and Furore which is known for its popularity as he bridge where divers plunge 28 meters into the sea. Many stories and movies have been staged there. The hillsides are covered in blooming morning glories, vineyards, and olive groves. We took a cruise along the coast past homes of Sophia Loren, Gina Lollabrigida, and Gore Vidal to name a few. We returned to Naples, had dinner, and prepared for our tour the next day to the Isle of Capri.

**THE ISLE OF CAPRI** is a large limestone/sandstone rock located on the southern end of the Gulf of Naples, first populated by the Greeks around 25AD. The main population centers are Anacapri and Capri which are mostly tourist areas. Anacapri is the town high in the hills and most residents are ordinary folks. Capri is in the lower coastal area and is an upscale, ritzy area that caters to the ultra-wealthy. There is an old convent that was on the island that boasts the creation of the first perfumes in 1682 – long before the Parisians. The road between the two towns (known as the Momma Mia road) is a curvy, twisty mountain road, one lane in places, but is quite impressive. The far end of the island is a high promontory named Tiberius Mount. We left Capri and went back to the Naples terminal to go back through Rome and on to Tarantula to the Villa in Tuoro.



**TUORO** is a municipality north of Tarantula in the Umbria region and located on the north shore of Lake Trasimeno. This is 25 miles north of Perugia. The villa is an enchanting old stone block home in the hills, tucked between rows of olive trees. It is one of five quaint little homes on the green hill that also has almond and fig trees. It features a delightful pergola in the backyard where we could relax, read or watch the birds, squirrels, and falcons. There is a stone oven outside where pizza or steaks can be grilled and has all the necessary amenities inside. We all settled in when we arrived, had some wine, and went to bed. In the morning we had pastry and coffee or tea and decided to visit the lake and maybe have a picnic lunch there.

**LAKE TRASIMENO** is North of the Tiber River and slightly smaller than the more familiar Lake Como and has a surface area of 49.4 miles. It is rich in fish such as pike, carp, tench, crawfish, black bullhead, stone moroko and gold fish. There are three islands on the lake and several castles around it. We had a tasty lunch on the shore, of trout, and of course pasta and wine. Then we proceeded down the road and explored an old convent complex. On the way back we naturally had to stop for gelato—then home and to bed. The next morning we planned to take the train from Tarantula north to go to **FLORENCE** (known as Firenze by the citizens). It is the capital of Tuscany and was the center of medieval European trade. It was ruled early on by the Medici family and is another UNESCO World Heritage site. There are many museums and the 4<sup>th</sup> largest cathedral in the world – the Santa Maria del Fiore – more commonly known as The Duomo. It has the largest brick and mortar dome in the world. We walked the 463 steps up to the top on narrow circular steps. It was hot, but well worth the effort to reach the pinnacle. The frescos are gorgeous! Just a magnificent structure! The Galleria del Academia houses Michelangelo's magnificent sculpture of DAVID. We returned to Tuoro on the train and went to bed for early rise in the morning for our trip to Switzerland and Germany to visit the towns of Schupbach.
