What is the history behind Father's Day?

As with **Mother's Day history**, the origins of Father's Day can be traced back to the early 20th century. The story starts with a woman named Sonora Smart Dodd in Spokane, Washington, who was inspired by her widowed father. She and her five siblings were raised by their father, a Civil War veteran and single parent. According to *History*, Dodd wanted to establish an official day equivalent to Mother's Day and proposed the idea to local churches, YMCAs, and even government officials.

That first Father's Day was celebrated on June 19th, 1910, in Spokane. But it wasn't until several years later that it started to gain popularity in other parts of the country. In 1916, President Wilson honored the day by unfurling a flag in Spokane, and in 1924, President Coolidge urged states to recognize the day.

But still, it wasn't easy. Folks were skeptical about the idea of a day to honor fathers, thinking it was too sentimental and that it was attempting to "domesticate manliness with flowers and gift-giving," as one **historian noted**. It was not until 1972 that Father's Day was officially recognized as a national holiday in the United States, signed into law by President Richard Nixon. So, let's tip our hats to Sonora and all those who helped make Father's Day the special day it is today.

In our own little way we honor their sacrifices by our memorial day display each May. Our display is growing each year as new residents move in and others find pic-



"Dear Lord, lest I continue my complacent way, help me to remember somehow out there a man died for me today. As long as there be war I then must ask and answer, "Am I worth dying for." Our Memorial Day means so much more than just the beginning of summer.

HOST AND HOSTESS DUTIES

- Start about an hour before the event time, place salt & pepper shakers on each table, tables should already be set up.
- Place table numbers on each table (depending on how many people and tables we have).
- Please be sure to have everyone that will be handling or serving food wear gloves. THIS IS A MUST.
- Make sure tablecloths are on each long table (one for desserts and three for serving food.
- Put dinner paper plates on the end of the long table and smaller plates on the dessert table.
- Put silverware and napkins on the long table (knives, forks, and spoons in wicker baskets). Also, knives, forks, and spoons on the dessert table.
- Get serving spoons, spatulas (for desserts) and tongs, if necessary, on each table where needed.
- Make coffee (either one large pot or two small pots depending on the weather and how many are signed up.
- Make sure sugar, creamer and stir sticks are on the counter with coffee cups.
- As residents arrive, welcome them, and instruct them where to place their dish and uncover the food when ready to serve.
- Make sure the PRAYER is being said. It is on the wall next to the front door of the clubhouse.
- Call everyone for dinner by using the numbers on the table or calling a playing card.
- After the meal is over, remove salt and pepper and table numbers or cards.
- Wipe down each table with a clean cloth.
- Empty coffee pots, clean and store.
- Wash all utensils and put them away,
- Clean counters and any other dishes that belong to the clubhouse.
- Take home all the used clothes, wash and return to the clubhouse.

Others will be responsible for setting up and taking down serving tables.

Having Type II Diabetes I am always concerned about how I dispose of my pen needles from my insulin. After doing a little research I found this article from AZ Dept of Environmental Quality and thought it would be helpful to share this.

Any needles you use can be disposed this way:

Every year, people throughout the country use billions of needles, syringes and lancets — also known as sharps — to manage medical conditions at home. Improperly discarded sharps potentially expose people to infection or injury, pos-ing a health risk not only to sanitation, housekeeping and janitorial workers, but also pets, children and other family members. Besides stick wounds, used needles can also transmit serious diseases from herpes to HIV. The following guidelines provide methods to properly dispose sharps and protect yourself and others.

Disposal Options for Individuals Using Sharps at Home

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has identified several ways to safely discard medical sharps:

Place sharps in either a medical sharps container (purchased from a pharmacy or health care provider) or in a heavy plastic or metal container. • Use household containers, such as plastic detergent bottles, only if the lid is secured with heavy-duty tape and the words, "Do Not Recycle," are written on the container with a permanent marker.

- Never place the container in the recycle bin.
- Do not overfill containers. To maximize space, you can use a needle cutter/destroyer (severs needles from the sy-ringe and costs anywhere from \$5 to \$140).
- Keep containers out of reach from children and pets.
 Fully encapsulate sharps prior to disposal in a solid waste receptacle. (You can add quick-drying cement, plaster or simi-lar materials to the container of sharps as long as you allow the container to dry before disposal.)

Following are some programs that will send you special containers and packaging, dispose of them properly, and send you a new empty set to refill. Please note that these programs will only accept sharps disposal containers that they send to you.


